Cars go to Killybegs daily at six in the morning to meet the Dublin Packet, and return at eight in the evening. The nearest coach town is Boyle fourteen miles distant, where the Sligo and Dublin mail passes daily.

COLOONEY

IS a small market town in the county of Sligo, 98 miles and three quarters north west of Dublin, 5 and a quarter south of Sligo, and 6 north of Ballymote. The Protestant church, a handsome edifice, dedicated to St. Paul, and built in the Gothic style with a high spire and a good clock, possesses a fine toned organ and a bell presented by Edward Synge Cooper, esq. who gives 20 guineas a year, and 5 acres of land, in aid of a free school for 50 boys; his son Edward Joshua also gives 12 guineas a year towards the support of a school for girls. The Catholics possess a parish chapel. The present vicar of the church is the Rev. William Hancock. Colooney, although small, is the best linen and linen yarn market in this county; this market is held every Thursday, and a premium of five shillings is given by E. S. Cooper, esq. for the best piece of linen, 4 shillings for the second, and 3 shillings for the third; as a further encouragement to industry, he gives 4s. and 2d. for the best warp of

yarn, 3s. and 4d. for the second, 2s. and 6d. for the third, and 2s. for the fourth. The linen hall erected 30 years ago of stone, at the sole expense of E. C. Cooper, esq. is a good building, and contains stabling for upwards of 30 horses. Extensive bleach works have been established here many years; they belong to A. Kelly, esq. and give employment to most of the inhabitants. In the year 1798 about 700 French landed at Killala, proceeded to this town, and encamped on the site of the present bleach works. Shortly after the Limerick militia and a few of the yeomanry arrived, when a battle ensued, and the British troops were obliged to retreat with the loss of several killed and wounded; but the French forces surrendered in a few days at Ballinamuck. The market is on Thursday; and the fairs are on May the 3rd, June the 1st, August the 9th, and September the 6th. The Population is about 700.

DRUMSNA

IS a small post, and fair town in the county of Leitrim, delightfully situated on the banks of the river Shannon, over which is a fine stone bridge of seven arches; it is distant seventy-three miles west-north-west from Dublin, seven north-west from Ruskey, three and a half south-east from Carrick-on-Shannon, twelve north-west from Newtown-Forges, and fourteen north-west from Longford. It is the residence of many respectable gentlemen, and the domains of Sir Robert Kinz, and Admiral Sir Josias

Rowley adjoin the town. The church, situate at Anaduff one mile from this place, is a neat stone edifice with a square tower, and has been finished about five years; the present rector is the Rev. Dr. Thos. Smyth. The ruins of the old church are still standing, attached to which is a good burying ground. Fairs are held on May the 20th, June the 22nd, August the 25th, and December the 14th. Population about 400.

POST OFFICE.—Post Mistress, Mr. Wm. Lucy. The Dublin mail is despatched at half-past three in the afternoon—arrives at twenty minutes past ten in the morning. Carrick-on-Shannon, Boyle, Colooney, and Sligo mails depart at 25 minutes past ten in the morning—arrive at half past three in afternoon. Ruskey and Longford mails arrive and depart with the Dublin mail. A by-mail to Cascarrigan at twenty-five minutes past ten in the morning on Sundays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Letters for England and Scotland go by the Dublin mail.

ELPHIN,

IN the county of Roscommon, is a post and fair town, seventy-five miles west-north-west of Dublin, twelve north of Roscommon, eight east-south-east of Boyle, and twelve north-east of Castlereagh. It is an episcopal see, and the residence of the bishop and dean of the diocese. The public buildings are a neat modern-built church; a Catholic chapel; a diocesan school under the direction of the Rev. Wm. Smith, vicar-general of Elphin; a dispensary, which extends its blessings to many; and a public hospital, now

building by subscription. About a mile south of the town is Ballyoughter, which is said to be the birth place of the celebrated Dr. Goldsmith. Elphin stands on an elevated situation, the neighbourhood is extremely pleasant, and the land very fertile. The bishop's palace is a fine modern building, and his establishment contributes much to the support of the town. Fairs are held on the 3rd of May, the 29th of June, the 29th of September, and the 10th of December. Population upwards of 800.

POST OFFICE.—Post Mistress, Mrs. Margaret Crawford. The Dublin mail, through Strokestown, arrives daily at one in the afternoon, and is despatched at five in the morning. Office hours from seven in the morning to ten in the evening.
