TUAM,

IN the county of Galway, is 19 miles west of Dublin, 16 north-west of Galway, 26 north-west of Ballinasloe, and 26 north-north-west of Loughrea. Its situation, though low, is accounted healthy, and it is the seat of the Archbishop of Tuam. In the year 487 an abbey was founded here, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which in the beginning of the sixth century, was made a cathedral by St. Jarlath, and a city was afterwards built here in honour of this exemplary bishop, whose remains were preserved in a chapel called Temple-na-ferin, or the Church of the Shrine. After the death of this saint, we find express mention made of three persons, who were abbots of Tuam, viz. Cellach, son of Eochad, who died in the year 808; Nuadet-Hua-Boichain, abbot and anchorite, who died October 3rd, 877; and Conach, son of Kieran, abbot of Tuam and prior of Clonsfert, who died in 879. The priory of St. John the Baptist was founded about the year 1140, by Tirdelave O'Connor, king of Ireland. It is not certain in what order this house belonged, but it was granted to Richard Clauricarde. The abbey of the Holy Trinity was founded either in the reign of king John, or in that of Henry III. for Premonstratensian Canons. Tuam, with all its churches, was destroyed by fire in 1244. The present cathedral, a venerable pile, is a mixture of the Saxon and Gothic styles of architecture, in which the former predominates. Its exterior, besides other ornaments, is adorned with a perfect, and highly ornamented Saxon arch, which is considered a rare and valuable relic of antiquity. The whole building is now undergoing a thorough repair; it will receive many additions and improvements, and the style, on its completion, will be rendered strictly Gothic, with the exception

of the Saxon arch, which will form the grand entrance. The archbishop is the Honbl. and most Rev. Power Trench; the Honbl. and Rev. William Beresford is rector, and the Rev. Lewis Potter, curate. The Roman Catholic chapel, situated in Chapel-lane, is a neat and commodious building. The Roman Catholic Archbishop is the most Rev. Dr. Kelly, under whose patronage is the Roman Catholic College, or seminary of St. Jarlath, which is well provided with professors in the different branches of literature. Here is also a Roman Catholic free school, which was instituted about four years ago, and is supported by private contributions. The Protestant free school was erected by the present archbishop in the year 1823, and is jointly supported by his grace, and the Dublin bible society. Tuam dispensary, which annually affords relief to 5000 applicants, was founded in the year 1813, by Lord Decies Beresford, and is now supported by subscriptions and donations. In the centre of the town stands the market house, a plain, square, stone building. The palace of the archbishop is a handsome edifice, surrounded by a beautiful and finely wooded demesne. In Tuam and its neighbourhood the manufacture of coarse linen is carried on to a considerable extent, and there is a linen market held at the Connaught hotel every Friday. Previous to the peace, Tuam was a considerable garrison town, but is at present without a single military detachment. The municipal government is vested in a sovereign and 12 burgesses; there are also a consistorial and a metropolitan court. The fairs are the 10th of May, 5th of July, 20th of October, and 15th of December. The market held on Saturday, is generally well provided.—The population is estimated at 6000.

POST OFFICE, Shop-street.—Post Master, Thomas Hicks. The mail from Dublin arrives every afternoon at a quarter past two, and is despatched every morning at eleven. Cross-posts from Headford and Dunmore arrive every morning at fifteen minutes past ten.
