**BANTRY,**

A Small but very populous town, in the county of Cork, one hundred and seventy miles south-west of Dublin, forty-six west-south-west of Cork, and thirty west of Bandon. It is situated at the bottom of one of the finest and most extensive bays in the universe, capable of containing all the shipping in Europe. Near this town, Ireton erected fortifications with four regular bastions in the protectorship of Cromwell. The bay is memorable for a naval victory obtained by Admiral Herbert, over the French fleet in the year 1690. Here also a formidable French armament destined to invade Ireland, was totally dispersed in the year 1796. The Earl of Bantry is the proprietor of this town, & has an elegant mansion within a quarter of a mile of it, situated on a slight eminence, commanding a most delightful prospect of the bay with a tract of rich and cultivated country, and at a distance a long chain of stupendous mountains, the bold and romantic appearance of which has a grand and awful though not unpleasant appearance. His Lordship has also a delightful cottage at a short distance from the

town, situate in the most charming and romantic spot that can well be imagined; and at one of those pleasing retreats this distinguished nobleman devotes the greater part of his leisure and fortune to the improvement and cultivation of his large estates, thereby giving employment to the poor, and setting a rare example to other noblemen and gentlemen, who derive their riches and superfluities from this ill-requited country. The chief business of the town is fishing, which is carried on to a very considerable extent, and gives employment to the majority of its population. The linen trade, though in its infancy, is rapidly increasing, and cannot fail of having a most beneficial tendency, in ameliorating the condition of the poor. The church is a new and elegant Gothic structure, having a lofty tower adorned with four pinnacles; but the interior remains in an unfinished state. The Roman Catholics and Wesleyan dissenters have commodious places of worship. A large school house is now erecting, where poor Catholic children will receive education, to defray the expense of building

**CAHIR**

Is a handsome thriving little town in the county of Tipperary, pleasantly situated on the river Suir, eighty-eight miles south west of Dublin, eight west of Clonmel, eight nearly south of Cashel, twelve south-east of Tipperary, forty-one north by east of Cork, and thirty two west-north-west of Waterford. The church, which was erected in 1817, is a spacious stone structure of the Gothic order, has a well proportioned spire and steeple; its interior finished in a chaste, yet superb style may vie in appearance with any church in the kingdom. The Hon. and Rev. Augustus Cavendish is Rector. The Catholic Chapel, of which the Rev. John Power is priest, was erected in 1790; it is a large plain building, and, what is an uncommon circumstance, has a handsome lofty spire. This town can boast of numerous charitable institutions, the most extensive and beneficial of which is a linen factory, under the protection of the Cahir local association, the original formation of which was in 1809. The evils arising to females from the want of employment, induced this committee in Nov. 1820, to turn their attention to the foundation of a spinning school. Earl Glengall having gratuitously supplied one hundred and fifty wheels, a few trifling subscriptions were made for the purchase of flax. The anxiety evinced by the girls to gain instruction stimulated the endeavours of the committee; greater interest was excited than had been contemplated; some liberal donations laid the foundation of their enlarged views; and through the bounty of the English committees, and other assistance, the fund has lately increased beyond what was ever anticipated by the most sanguine expectant.
