

stately mansion of the Barrymore family, which was consumed by fire in 1771. In removing some of the old castle walls a stone chimney piece was discovered, on which was inscribed, *O'Lehan hoc fecit MCIII.* (O'Lehan erected this in the year 1103) which furnishes proof that private stone structures were erected in Ireland at an earlier period than is generally allowed. The parish church, dedicated to St. Nicholas, is a chaste building, situated on a gentle declivity near the Fermoy road, and close to the town; in this church yard, over the family vault, is erected a marble statue of James, Earl of Barrymore, who, in the reign of Queen Anne, was eminently distinguished for his virtues as a patriotic statesman and philan-

thropist. The Rev. Mr. Wybrants, of Cloyne, is rector, and the Rev. John W. Edgar officiates as curate; the latter resides at High Park, about a mile from the town. In 1771, about half a mile east of the town, a neat Catholic chapel was erected, of which the Rev. Mr. Maume is priest; he is assisted in his duties by the Rev. Mr. O'Donovan, as coadjutor. A free school is now erecting here by the munificence of Samuel Perrott, esq. of Cork, which will afford facilities of education to upwards of fifty children of the parish. This neighbourhood, which, till lately, was exclusively occupied by dairies, and totally destitute of agricultural improvements, is now in a high state of cultivation.

Rathcormac is the nearest Post Office.

CASTLE-MARTYR,

In the county of Cork, formerly called Ballymartyr, and Leper's-town, is a small market town, one hundred and eighteen miles and a half south east of Dublin Castle, and is chiefly noted as being the residence of the Earl of Shannon, who has a noble seat here. It was a borough previous to the union, and gave the title of Baron to a branch of the noble family of Boyle. Here is a charter school for forty children, liberally endowed by the Earl of Shannon, in 1749. There is also

a handsome church and an almshouse: a spinning school has been established, for the encouragement of the linen manufacture. This place was formerly the residence of a branch of the Fitzgeralds; it was incorporated in the year 1663, through the influence of the first Earl of Orrery. The market is held on Saturday; and fairs on the 2d of October and the second of May.

POST OFFICE.—*Post Master*, Mr. James Taylor. The Mail from Dublin arrives *via* Waterford at seven in the evening, and is despatched at seven in the morning. The Mail from Cork arrives at seven in morning and returns at seven in the evening.

CHARLEVILLE,

Is a large and highly respectable market town, distant 112 miles south west of Dublin, 30 north of Cork, 20 south of Limerick, 14 north of Mallow, and 58 north east of Killarney, by Macroom. It is pleasantly situated on the confines of the county of Cork, and owes its establishment to Roger, first Earl of Orrery, and Lord President of Munster, who held his court here, and bestowed on its improvement a portion of that munificence, for which the noble family of Boyle has been eminently distinguished. Among other spirited acts, was the liberal endowment of a free school, and a charter school. It was a corporate town, governed by a sovereign, two bailiffs, and twelve burgesses, and, until the union, returned two members to Parliament. Here a court for the recovery of debts to the amount of one hundred pounds and upwards, and there are weekly petty sessions. The situation of the town was well chosen, as it stands on the great road leading from Cork to Limerick, in a very rich and fertile country, and possesses the advantage of being well supplied with

water: its greatest want is that of fuel, which was probably little felt at the time of its establishment, when wood was in sufficient abundance. Charleville, however, under the disadvantage above mentioned, has been lately much improved; the markets are excellent, and the town is well furnished with good shops, for the supply of the adjacent country, as well as the inhabitants, among whom are many opulent residents. The church is a plain structure; the Catholic chapel a new, spacious and commodious building. The market is held on Saturday, and fairs on the 10th of October, and the 12th of November. At the distance of six miles from Charleville, on the road to Mallow, is situate the ancient town of Buttant, formerly a place of very great note: its present wretchedness exhibits some vestiges of its religious buildings, now nothing more than a heap of ruins. The castle has been repaired by its present owner, Sir John Anderson, and is become an elegant and respectable mansion.

POST OFFICE.—*Post Master*, Mr. Alexander Eyre Eddington. The Mail arrives from Limerick and Dublin on its way to Cork, at 47 minutes past two in the afternoon, and is despatched on its arrival from Cork at a quarter past eleven in the morning.
