CLONMEL

IS the assize and county town of Tipperary, distant 82 miles south west from Dublin, 24 south west from Kilkenny, 24 north west from Waterford, 43 north east from Cork, 20 south east from Tipperary, and 41 south east from Limerick. It is governed by a mayor, recorder, town clerk, and bailiffs. As the principal streets are long, broad, and filled with shops plentifully stored with such articles, as either capricious fancy, or actual necessity may require, this town assumes a very respectable appearance; and being the nearest mart for the produce of a fertile and extensive district, and situated on the river Suir, which is navigable hence to Waterford, it commands a very considerable trade in the export of provisions, and other agricultural produce.—The parish church, dedicated to St. Mary, is a large Gothic building situated in Mary-street; it has a lofty octagonal steeple, and the interior is of a plain yet elegant appearance. In the church yard is a pleasant walk shaded by trees, which has a picturesque and pleasing effect. There are two Catholic chapels; the one recently erected in Johnson-street is a large and neat structure; the other of great antiquity is in Irishtown. There are also two Methodist chapels, a meeting house for the Society of Friends, a Presbyterian chapel, and an Anabaptist chapel.—The work house, or house of industry, is in an airy situation about a quarter of a mile from Irishtown. This excellent institution, which was opened in 1811, was built, and is principally supported, by county presentments; it is a receptacle for the infirm poor, and has a department for vagrants, one for lunatics, and another for orphans, who are, during infancy, comfortably provided with the necessaries of life, and, when arrived at proper years, apprenticed to the trade most suitable to their dispositions. All who bear commissions as county magistrates are governors, and have by act of parliament the power of nominating others to act in the same capacity.—The fever hospital and dispensary are handsome stone buildings, and fully answer the purposes for which they were erected, being, like the other establishments of utility, most liberally supported by annual subscriptions in the town and neighbourhood.—The county gaol in Richmond-street is an extensive stone fabric. The court house, eligibly situated in Nelson-street, is a light, handsome, structure, in which a tholose court is held every Wednesday. In Duncan-street there is a select commercial coffee room, supported by subscription; and at Mr. Sutherland's royal mail coach hotel there is an excellent subscription news room.—Under

the superintendance of the Rev. Dr. Robert Bell is the school of Clonmel, which was endowed by the Moore family, the ancestors of the present Earl of Mountcashel, about 150 years since, with lands which now produce 400l. per annum. The school house is at present in ruins, but government is about to lend the sum of 3,500l. for the erection of a new building, and the loan is to be repaid by the master in annual instalments of 6 per cent. Col. Bagwell of Marlfield, who, as proprietor of the corporation property, has the patronage of the school, and also of the living of Clonmel, has granted a new site for the purpose on the main road from Dublin to Cork.—The butter market house is a capacious building, containing suitable offices for the inspector &c. &c. Here all butter, that is sold either for home use or for exportation, must be regularly weighed and entered. The quantity disposed of during the season from May to January is from 45 to 50,000 firkins.—The corn market is as extensive as any in the kingdom, and the merchants and traders evince a more enterprising spirit, and transact more business, than those of any town of equal size in Ireland; and it is affirmed as a fact, that one fifth of the whole quantity of flour, exported from this Kingdom, was last year shipped by one establishment alone in this industrious and prosperous town.—Three bridges over the Suir within the limits of the town communicate with the county of Waterford; that at the east entrance consists of four well-formed arches, the centre one has three, the western or workhouse bridge has five, and is on the direct road to Youghal and the ferry.—At the east entrance into the town stand two handsome and extensive barracks, one for artillery, the other for infantry; there is also a military hospital, erected in an elevated and healthy situation.—Several improvements are projected, such as the endowed school already mentioned, a parochial school house for the education of the lower classes; and gas works will very shortly be established for the purpose of lighting the town with gas.—In this neighbourhood are ranges of lofty mountains, whose dark shades form a striking contrast with the extreme beauty and lively verdure of the lower scenery, which consists of gently swelling lawns rising in constant succession, at intervals well wooded, and the whole pleasantly diversified with the seats of nobility and gentry.—That celebrated author of original genius and great sensibility of heart, the Rev. Lawrence Sterne, was born in this town on the 24th of November, 1713. In the neighbourhood there is a medicinal spring, by which chronic

distempers have been radically cured; it drew thither, some years ago, a great resort of people, but fashion, which reigns with absolute authority, has lately brought other waters into higher credit.—The ancient borough of Clonmel returns one member to parliament, and is at present represented by James Hewitt Massey Daw-

son, esq. of New Forest in this county. Its market days are Tuesday and Saturday. Fairs are held on the first Wednesday in every month, and there are also two old established fairs on the 5th of May, and 5th of November. The population is estimated at nearly 16,000.
