

KENMARE,

IN the county of Kerry, is distant 150 miles south west of Dublin, 30 south by east of Tralee, 12 south by west of Killarney, 31 south east of Dingle, and 28 south by west of Listowel. It is a small town, nearly surrounded by the romantic mountains of Kerry, and built on the banks of a broad navigable river of the same name, which empties itself into the sea, and is capable of admitting ships of any burthen within a short distance of the town. The church is a modern structure, but without any ornament. The Roman Catholic chapel is a large substantial building, and a new bridewell is about to be erected. Petty

sessions are held here once a week, at which James Hickson, esq. Richard Mahony, senr. and junr. esqrs. R. O. Townsend, esq. and the Rev. Wm. Godfrey alternately preside. To the westward of the town are the ruins of Dunkerron and Cappanacross castles; the former was built by Owen O'Sullivan, the latter was formerly a residence of O'Sullivan More. Market day; the charter is for Saturday, but it is not held. There are fairs on the 15th of March, on the 22d of May, the 1st of July, the 15th of August, the 26th of September, the 20th of November, and the 20th of December.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Wm. Irvine. The mail from Killarney arrives every Monday, Thursday, and Saturday, between eight and nine at night, and departs every Monday, Thursday, and Saturday morning at three.

KILLALOE,

IN the county of Clare, distant 86 miles and a half from Dublin Castle, is situated on the western bank of the river Shannon, over which there is a bridge consisting of nineteen arches, but in so dilapidated a condition as to be impassable, though it is in contemplation to have it repaired. This is a very ancient town, but quite destitute of trade. The cathedral is a venerable structure, large and simple, but contains few monuments. Killaloe was erected into an epis-

copal see in the fifth century. In the twelfth century it was incorporated with the ancient bishopric of Roscrea. The navigation of the river is here interrupted by a ledge of rocks, running across its bed, to obviate which difficulty a canal has been cut which opens an inland water communication between Limerick and Dublin. Fairs are held on the 20th of April, the 8th of June, and the 3rd of September.

KILLARNEY,

A MARKET, post and fair town in the county of Kerry, distant 143 miles south-west of Dublin, 45 west by north of Cork, 16 south-east of Tralee, 31 east by south of Dingle, and 28 south of Listowel, and situated in the barony of Magunihy, is a handsome, well paved, thriving town, and during the summer is the resort of a great assemblage of visitors, who come from all quarters to view the unrivalled scenery of its romantic lakes. The Church consists of one aisle, has some handsome monuments, and a painting on glass in the eastern window. Though the exterior is contradictory to all rules of architecture, it has, nevertheless, a very venerable and interesting appearance. The Roman Catholic chapel is a handsome building in the New-street, and beside it is the residence of the Right Rev. Charles Sugrue, the titular bishop; in the same street there is a presentation convent, in which is held a free school for educating female children. The Earl of Kenmare allows the convent one hundred pounds a year, and clothes 30 of the girls; he also clothes and apprentices 20 boys out of another school, which is under the patronage of the Catholic bishop. A Protestant free school has been lately erected, and will be supported by the annual subscriptions of the Protestant gentry. Quarter sessions are held here, as well as a manor court once a month for the recovery of debts under 40 shillings. The town has three club and reading rooms. About two miles distant,

on the way to Mangerton Mountain, Ivrelagh, or Mucruss abbey, rears its venerable head amidst lofty limes and ashes: it was founded by Donald M'Carthy in 1440 for conventual Franciscans, and has since been the cemetery of the M'Carthys. Donald, Earl of Clancare, and his nephew Patrick Lord Kerry were entombed here in 1600. The choir contains several monuments with inscriptions, and on a large white stone are the armorial bearings of the M'Carthy Mores. The cloister is in a very perfect state, in the centre of which stands an immense yew, whose stem rises perpendicularly upwards of 30 feet, and its spreading branches, like an immense umbrella, overshadow the whole cloister, so as to form a gloomy canopy. On the road to Castlemain are the ruins of Aghadoe, an ancient episcopal see, united to Limerick in 1663, and near it the remains of a round tower. Dunloe castle, which formerly belonged to the O'Sullivans, now the seat of Major Mahony, is situated on the extremity of the lower lake. On the other side of the river may be seen all that remains of a noble residence of the M'Carthy Mores. Ross castle, built by the family of O'Donnoghue Ross, and situated on Ross Island, was dismantled by General Ludlow in 1652, to whom it was surrendered by Lord Muskerry. Saturday is the market-day, and fairs are held on the 1st of July and the 11th of November.

POST OFFICE, New-street.—Post Master, Mr. Daniel Casey. The mails from Dublin, Ballincollig, Cork, Macroom and Mill-Street, arrive at half past four every afternoon, and are despatched at eight every morning. The mail from Kenmare arrives every Monday, Thursday and Saturday morning at half past seven, and departs on the same evenings at five. The mail from Tralee arrives every morning at half past seven, and departs every afternoon at about ten minutes before five. A by-mail from Adair, Cahirseeven, Limerick, Listowel, Milltown, Newcastle and Rathkeale, arrives at half past seven in the morning, and departs at ten minutes before five in the evening.
