RATHCORMAC,

IN the county of Cork, is a small town near the river Bride, consisting of one street on the mail road to Dublin, from which it is 111 miles distant, 4 from Fermoy, and 13½ north of Cork. It contains a neat church, which is adorned with a spire and steeple, and a Catholic chapel of the Gothic order, which was erected in 1818. This place has enjoyed, since the Union, a patent for holding a market, but it has not for some time availed itself of this privilege. In the vicinity stands Lisnegar, the seat of the present

Lord Riversdale; this structure is now undergoing a thorough repair, and is receiving such improvements, as will render it fit for the reception of its noble proprietor, whose occasional residence here, it is anticipated, will ultimately tend to the benefit of a town, possessing in itself many local advantages. Three miles south are the ruins of Mount Catherine. A fair is held here on the 12th of August, and another on the 29th of October.

RATHKEALE,

IN the county of Limerick, is a market, post and fair town, agreeably situated on the river Deel, 108 miles south west of Dublin, 14 south west of Limerick, and 42 north north west of Cork. It was formerly a corporation town, and of much more conse-

quence than it is at present, as it obstinately and successfully resisted various assaults of the English army during the rebellion, which desolated this island in the reign of Queen Elizabeth. At a very early age a priory for Augustinian canons, under the invocation

is an ancient town on the borders of the King's and Queen's Counties, in the county of Tipperary, 59 miles S. W. of Dublin, 40 N. of Clonmel, and 35 N.E. of Limerick. It was erected into a bishoprick in the year 620, by St. Cronan; but in the twelfth century was united to Killaloe. Some remains of the Cathedral may be seen in the west front of the old church, executed in the beautiful style of the ninth century. Near it is a large stone cross, called the Shrine of St. Cronan, as well as one of the largest round towers in the kingdom, built of square stones, and in excellent preservation. Near this town the Danes met their first signal defeat; they had marched from Limerick and Coinaught to surprise the inha-

bitants, then assembled at the great annual fair of Roscrea, which held fourteen days; but the people had notice of their approach, marched out to oppose them, and gave them so great an overthrow, that 4000 Danes lay dead in the field, amongst whom was Oflin, their chief. In 1213 King John erected a large castle here, (being the bounds of the English pale) as a protection against the incursions of the natives. Roscrea is now a thriving trading town; it has a barrack for a regiment of foot, a large new church, built in 1812 in the Gothic style, a Roman Catholic chapel, two Methodist chapels, a Quakers' meeting house, a bridewell, a free school, public shambles and market house, where a manor court is held
