TALLOW,

ON the banks of the river Bride, and at the western extremity of the county of Waterford, is a small but neat market, post and fair town, distant four miles south-west of Lismore, 38 west by south of Waterford, 33 north east of Cork, and on the mail road between the two latter places. It was erected into a borough by James I. at the request of the first Earl of Cork, by charter, its liberties were to extend a mile and a half round the church, considered as a centre. This place, previous to the union, returned two members to parliament, but its electors were of the description called *potwollers*, though the Duke of Devonshire had the principal influence. It has now lost its elective franchise, and is of less conse-

quence in every respect than it was formerly. The town was never walled, nor a place of strong natural defence; but in the rebellion of 1641 an entrenchment was cast round it by the forementioned Earl, who maintained in it, at his private expense, a garrison of 100 men, for the protection of the inhabitants. To the west of the bridge are the ruins of Lisfinny Castle, formerly the property of the Earl of Desmond. Tallow contains a market-house and a neat church with a square tower, and is a desirable residence, as the scenery of the neighbourhood is very fine. Fairs are held on the 1st of March, the 14th of June, the 10th of October, and the 8th of December.

POST OFFICE.—*Post Mistress*, Mrs. Perry. The mail from Dublin and Waterford arrives at half-past three in the afternoon, and returns at half-past ten in the morning. The Cork letters go and return by the same conveyance.

TARBERT.

ON the north-eastern verge of the county of Kerry, is a small market, post, and fair town, 124 miles south-west of the metropolis, 3 west by south of Limerick, 50 north north west of Cork, and 25 north north east of Tralee. Here is a charter school liberally endowed by the late Right Rev. Dr. Leslie, bishop of Limerick. Towards the end of Lord Chichester's viceroyalty, and during the reign of James I. the seigniory of Tarbert was granted to Patrick Crosbie, esq. on condition of his protecting several Irish families, who were transplanted hither from the King's County. Mr. Crosbie's son Pierce sold this estate to Alderman Dominick Roche of Limerick, from whose family it was purchased by

Lord Clare, who forfeited it for his attachment to James II. and upon the revolution it came to the family of Leslie. The church is a venerable pile, and its situation is truly picturesque; the Catholic chapel is about a mile distant. Opposite the town stands a small island in the Shannon, which has a commodious road and harbour, where vessels either bound for Limerick, or to sea, may find a convenient shelter from tempestuous weather. On the island are a tower and battery, to which is attached an establishment of engineers. The nominal market-day is Thursday, but it is not attended. Fairs are held on Easter-Monday, the 22nd of June, the 12th of August, and the 11th of December.

TEMPLEMORE,

IN the county of Tipperary, is a neat, modern, well built, thriving town, most delightfully situated in the centre of a very rich and fertile country, 68 miles south west of Dublin, 9 south of Roscrea, and 7 north by west of Thurles. The numerous and magnificent seats, the elegant cottages, and the beautiful and diversified scenery with which they are sur-

rounded, the total absence of those heaps of filth, which too often disgrace the habitations of the lower orders in this country, and the general neatness and cleanliness of the place, render this one of the most agreeable towns in the kingdom. The barracks are capable of containing 2000 men, and contribute considerably to the appearance of the town. The inha-
