TIPPERARY

Is a neat pleasant town in the county of the same name, from which it takes its name, situated between Limerick and Waterford, and eighty-seven miles south-west of Dublin. It consists chiefly of a principal street with several smaller ones branching off at right angles. Here are several public schools, two of which are on the foundation of Erasmus Smyth. The chief one is under the direction of the Rev. Marshall Clarke; the other, for the education of children of both sexes, consists of about one hundred boys and seventy girls, with no restriction as to religion. There is also a school under the London Hibernian Society, erected under the patronage of Dr. A. Armstrong; the boys and girls of the first class read the scripture, with which they are gratuitously supplied, as also with other books and school requisites, from the Kildare-street Society, Dublin. The Hon. E. G. Stanley, MP. has contributed much to the success of these schools. There is also a parish school for the education of thirty boys and ten girls, not confined to religious persuasions. There is also a branch of the Ladies' Association for the promoting of habits of industry among the female peasantry; it is under the patronage of the Countess of Glengall, Mrs. Armstrong, secretary. An association has also been

formed among the neighbouring gentry for the purpose of promoting the culture of flax; Mr. Joseph Prosser, secretary. An excellent dispensary is gratuitously attended by the resident physicians of the town, & an apothecary at a salary of sixty pounds per annum; five thousand patients received relief in 1823. It is also in contemplation to erect a fever hospital. The public buildings of this town are not numerous; the principal is the new church, which is calculated to hold one thousand persons; it is built entirely of lime-stone, and is considered one of the most elegant structures for its size in the kingdom; it consists of a nave and transept with side aisles and galleries; the window at the east end is well worthy of attention for its correctness and beautiful finish. The whole building is adorned with a tower seventy-two feet high surmounted by an elegant spire of seventy feet, and reflects great credit on the architect and builder the late John Bowden, esq, of Dublin, & Mr. Edward Featherston of Buttevant, who has now the sole superintendance of the works. Thursday is the market day, and there are four annual fairs on the 5th of April, the 24th of June, the 10th of October, and the 10th of December. The population is estimated at 7000.

TRALEE,

THE shire and assize town of the county of Kerry, is distant 150 miles south-west of Dublin, 61 north-west of Cork, 16 north by west of Killarney, 21 east by north of Dingle, 7 north of Milltown, 7 south-west of Listowel, 8 west of Castle Island, and 37 north by west of Kenmare. It is a commercial port, governed by a provost and 12 burgesses, and sends one member to parliament, under the patronage of Sir Edward Denny. Corn is the principal article of exportation, which has within these last twelve years increased in an unexampled degree. The church is a magnificent modern structure, and much superior to what is usually seen in this part of the kingdom.

The Roman Catholic chapel, situated in upper Castle-street, is well deserving of notice; it is a spacious building, fitted up in an elegant and superior manner. Near the church is a Methodist chapel, and on Prince's-quay a chapel for Independants. Much to the honour of this town there are several excellent and charitable institutions. The county infirmary is a neat building in High-street, the dispensary is in Abbey-street, and a fever hospital will shortly be erected, together with a linen hall and a diocesan school. There are schools established by the Roman Catholics and the London Hibernian Society, besides the parochial school. The goal is large and sufficient
