BALLYSHANNON,

IN the county of Donegal, is a thriving well built town, situated on an outlet, which discharges the waters of Lough Erne into the Atlantic. It is 101 miles north-west of Dublin, 11 south of Donegal, 20 north by east of Sligo, and 22 north-west of Enniskillen. Here is a fine cascade, deemed the greatest salmon leap in Ireland. The rights of the salmon fishery extend through the counties of Donegal, Fermanagh, Cavan, Leitrim and Tyrone; they belong to the trustees of the late Rt. Honbl. Thomas Conolly, and are leased for years and lives to Simon Sheil, M. D. The fishing commences about the middle of April, and continues till the latter end of August. Formerly the produce went to supply the Dublin, Newry, and Belfast markets, and the surplus was salted and sent to the Mediterranean; but of late the discovery of transmitting, to a considerable distance, fish packed in ice, has been applied in this quarter, and two extensive ice houses have been erected, so that the great bulk of the salmon from

this fishery is sent fresh to Liverpool. Extensive cellars, contiguous to the town, are leased with the salmon fishery, and produce eels of the finest description. Ballyshannon was a borough till the union, and sent members to the Irish parliament. Here are two fine barracks, and over the river is a good stone bridge of fourteen arches. In a commanding situation stands the parish church, a neat building; there are also a Catholic chapel and a dispensary, and on the north-west side of the town stand the ruins of an old abbey, formerly inhabited by monks of the Cistercian order. A good Pier to protect the shipping in the harbour, and a canal communicating with Long Erne, would soon render this a town of considerable commerce. At present it has a good market on Friday for corn and general purposes, and fairs are held on the 4th of April, the 7th of June, the 10th of September, and the 9th of November.—Population near 7000.

BANBRIDGE,

A THRIVING little town in the county of Down, is seated on an eminence on the mail road from Dublin to Belfast, 60 miles north of the former, and 20 south by west of the latter. It owes its chief importance to a considerable weekly market for linens, and its vicinity to the river Banu, a water highly favourable to the numerous bleach works which environ this place. It derives its name from its having a bridge over the Banu, at the northern extremity of the town. The parish church is above a mile from the town, on the road branching towards Guilford. The market house is a prominent object, as it divides the Main-street into two parts, and is adorned with a clock. The spacious room over it is appropriated as a school,

upon the Lancasterian system, in which about 200 children of both sexes daily attend; it is supported by subscription and by the liberality of the Marquis of Downshire, who is proprietor of the place, and to whom, in a great measure, the present prosperity of the town is to be attributed. The Presbyterians have a meeting house, the Roman Catholics a chapel, and two miles off is a Seceding meeting house. The Dispensary is supported by subscriptions and county presentments. The market day is Monday, and a fair is held on the 12th of January, for horses, which is the largest in Ireland; others are held on the 16th of March, 9th of June, 26th of August and 15th of November.
