

of war. The view from the top is singularly extensive and beautiful. This castle has been the scene of many conflicts, and has been alternately occupied by different contending parties. In the year 1760, being weakly garrisoned by about two hundred recruits, it was taken, after a brave resistance, by the French under the command of Mons. Thurot, who was afterwards killed, and whose squadron was taken by Commodore Elliott off Ramsey bay in the Isle of Man. This place was rendered memorable by the landing of King William in June 1690, previous to the battle of the Boyne. The civil government of the town is vested in a mayor, annually elected, a recorder, sheriffs, aldermen and burgesses, and it

returns one member to parliament. The church, an ancient building dedicated to St. Nicholas, contains several old monuments, particularly of the noble family of Chichester. The dissenting places of worship, three in number, are handsome and commodious. The county of Antrim court-house is a large, elegant structure in a good situation at the bottom of High-street; the goal is in a lane close adjoining. The neighbourhood of Carrickfergus is very pleasant, as it abounds with gentlemen's seats in a finely improved and fertile country; the whole line of road to Belfast along the shore is extremely interesting. There is a good weekly market on Saturday, and two fairs are held in the year, viz. the 12th of May and 1st of November.

CARRICKMACROSS

IS a market, fair and post town in the county of Monaghan, 39 miles north north west of Dublin, eight south of Castleblaney, eight north of Dromconry, 17 north north west of Slane, and 19 south west of Newry. It was formerly a town of note, and in the reign of Queen Elizabeth a castle was built here, which was the residence of the Earl of Essex, the queen's favourite, to whom she granted the barony of Farney in this county. The eastern part of this barony now belongs to the Marquis of Bath, and the western to the Shirley family of Easington-park, in Warwickshire. The church, which has been built about 32 years, is a neat stone edifice with a tower and spire, possessing a good clock with four dials; it is situate at the south end of the town, and fronts the main street. The remains of the old church are yet standing; it was burnt down during the rebellion of 1641, and rebuilt in 1682 at the conjoint expense of the Rt. Rev. Dr. Roger Boyle, Lord Bishop of Clogher, Wm. Barton, esq. and the Rev. Andrew Montgomery, then vicar of the parish. The castle was also burnt at the same time; it was then occupied by Wm. Barton, esq. who was lessee of the whole of the Earl of Essex's property, and represented the county of Monaghan; while he was attending his parliamentary duties, his wife and

children resided in the castle, and fell victims to the devouring flames. Carrickmacross contains a handsome Catholic chapel, which was built in the year 1783, by the Rt. Rev. Hugh O'Reilly, R. C. Bishop of Clogher, and Dr. James Carolan of this town; a free grammar school was also founded here in April 1711 by Lord Weymouth with an endowment of 75l. per annum; and a Dispensary was established in June 1823 by private subscription. The town consists of one principal street with several lanes diverging from each side; it is wide, and the houses are uniformly built, but the market house, which stands in the centre, prevents a view of the whole: it was built from the ruins of the old castle, part of the walls of which are still remaining in the garden of James Daniell, esq. The manufactures established here are soap, candles, tanned leather, brogues, or coarse shoes, and great quantities of coarse hats. Here are also a large and extensive brewery, distillery and malt house, which belong to Messrs. James Gartlan and Sons, and give employment to upwards of 300 families. The general market day is Thursday, and there is also a good corn market on Saturday. Fairs are held on May the 27th, July the 10th, Sept. the 27th, Nov. the 9th, and Dec. the 10th. The population in 1821 was 2389.
