

**CASTLEBLAYNEY**

Is a small post and market town, in the county of Monaghan, 48 miles north north west of Dublin, 13 south of Armagh, 14 north east of Cootehill, 6 east by north of Ballibay, 11 south east of Monaghan, 14 north east of Dundalk, and 9 north by west of Carrickmacross, and pleasantly situated in the heart of a well cultivated country. In the centre of the town stands the market-house, a neat stone edifice, adorned with a good clock. The church is a handsome building, with a fine spire; the present incumbent is the Rev. Thomas Hackett. Besides the church there is a Presbyterian and a Methodist meeting house, and near

the town is the Catholic chapel. Adjoining is the princely mansion of Lieutenant General Lord Blayney, commanding a beautiful and extensive prospect, which takes in a lake thickly interspersed with islands, covered with forest trees and evergreens, well calculated to diversify the beauty of the scene. The sessions are held at Castleblayney four times a year in a commodious building. There is a regular market every Wednesday, besides fairs on the first Wednesday in each month. The population in 1821 was 1400.

**CASTLE-DAWSON,**

IN the county of Derry, is a small town on the banks of the Myola, over which is a stone bridge with one arch, supposed to be larger in span than any other in Ireland. It is 92 miles north by west of Dublin, 2 north of Magherafelt, 10 south by east of Kilrea, 9 north east of Moneymore, 25 south of Coleraine, 26 west of Belfast, and 30 south east of Londonderry. In this town there is an obelisk, built by way of ornament at the sole expense of the late Earl of Bristol, Bishop of Derry, on the site of the old barracks. Here is a free school, for the education of both sexes, supported by subscription. In the year 1700 a Presbyterian meeting house was erected; here is also a Protestant chapel of ease, in so ruinous a state

that no service is performed in it, but ere long it is intended to be refitted. Adjoining the town is the magnificent castle of G. R. Dawson, esq. M. P. for the county of Derry, and proprietor of the town, now the residence of Captain John Henderson. Castle-Dawson has an extensive cotton factory and flour mill, belonging to Mr. Wm. Vance, which give employment to many of the lower classes of society, and a distillery belonging to Messrs. Johnston and Graves. A small detachment of infantry is stationed in the town, in a house fitted up for the purpose. The market day is Saturday, and there are fairs on New-year's day, Easter Wednesday, the 1st of June, and the 1st of August. Population about 600.

**POST OFFICE**—*Post Master*, Mr. James F. Heaney. The Dublin mail is despatched at half past eight in the evening, and arrives at a quarter past four in the afternoon. The Belfast mail leaves at the same time as the Dublin, and arrives at forty minutes past five in the evening. The Coleraine and Londonderry mails leave at half past six in the evening, and arrive at twenty-two minutes past six. Letters for England go by the Dublin mail, those for Scotland by Belfast.

**CASTLE-WELLAN**

Is a small but neat market town in the county of Down, 65 miles north of Dublin, 15 east north east of Newry, and 9 south west of Downpatrick. It gives title of Baron to the family of Annesley, who have here a delightful residence, with a large and well improved demesne, beautifully skirted with wood, and ornamented with elegant gardens, and pleasantly situated near a small lake. This charming place is encircled by romantic emineces, on the slope of one of which is erected an elegant temple, ornamented with a spire. Within two miles of the town is Tulloghmore Park, the splendid residence and demesne of the Earl of Roden; it is diversified with beautifully varied scenes of wood and water, and abounds with charming walks, and picturesque scenery. There are also many other large and extensive dwellings in the neighbourhood. Castlewellan belongs to the parish of Kilmeegan two miles distant, where the

parish church and chapel are situated; there are, however, two places of worship in the town, one belonging to the Seceders, the other to the Wesleyan Methodists. The market house is a good building, with a lofty spire, a clock and a bell; and the dispensary is supported by public subscription. The market is held on Monday, and there are six fairs in the year, viz. the 1st of February, the 1st of May, the 1st of June, the 1st of September, the 13th of November, and the Tuesday before Christmas.—Newcastle, distant three miles from Castle Wellan, is a very pleasant village, much frequented in the summer months for the benefit of the salt water, as well as the hot, cold and shower baths. The road hence to Kilkeele winds round the Mourne mountains, close to the sea, at the foot of the highest of which, the gloomy Slieb Donard, said to be above 1000 yards above the sea, stands the improving little village of Newcastle.
