**CAVAN,**

WHERE the assizes of the county are held, is a market, post and fair town, situated at the foot of several small hills, which diversify the face of the greater part of the county; the distance is fifty-four miles north-west of Dublin, fifteen north-west of Virginia, seven south-east of Belturbet, and twelve south-west of Clones. It is composed of one main street, with some smaller ones branching from it, and an intended street, already begun, is to run parallel with the present main street; it is named after the proprietor of the town, Lord Farnham, and in it is situated the new church, which is a very handsome structure with a lofty spire, but which, though it has been used for the purposes of divine service for six or seven years, is yet in an unfinished state; the new jail, a neat, commodious and secure building; the new inn, called the Farnham Arms; the new court-house (which is now erecting under the superintendance of Messrs. Colbourne & Williams, of Dublin, and which, when completed, will be a very ornamental building); the Cavan Herald newspaper office are in this street; and it contains two or three other private houses. In the main street are the county infirmary, an institution from which much benefit results to the county, and which is under the management of George Roe, esq, surgeon and M. D.; the old sessions' house, an unsightly piece of building; convenient shambles; and some tolerably good private houses and shops. The town is well situated for business, in which, however, little is transacted. Cavan is surrounded by several small towns and villages within a distance of seven miles, all of which would probably make this their market, if Cavan possessed a sufficient number of speculating and spirited capitalists. Among these towns are Ballynagh, which has an extensive linen market; Ballyhays, in which are very considerable flour-mills; Stradone; Crossdoney; Butler's-Bridge; Red-Hills, and the smart town of Belturbet. A small river runs through Cavan, and

after a course of about three miles, the chief part of which is through the beautiful demesne of Farnham, joins the Ballyhays river, and then proceeds through Belturbet, a little below which it joins Lough Erne, so that, at no very considerable expense, aided by a due degree of public spirit, Cavan might enjoy a navigation for vessels of several tons, which might easily be made to communicate with the proposed line of canal between Lough Neagh, and Lough Erne, should it be carried into effect. About six years ago the first newspaper was published in this county by its present proprietor G. W. Busted, whose family possesses extensive property in Ireland. This town formerly returned one member to Parliament, but its right of representation was purchased by government from the proprietor of the borough; since that time its corporation has fallen into decay, and the property which belonged to it, and which was not inconsiderable, has been shared among the burgesses, whose families now possess it as hereditary estates. Cavan is governed by a sovereign and deputy sovereign. On a dirty hill, adjoining the town, is an old and ill-looking barrack, in which two companies of infantry are generally stationed; and about a quarter of a mile in a different direction they are now constructing a new fever-hospital. Some of the country round Cavan is very fine, particularly about Farnham and Kilmore, two beautiful domains, the former belonging to Lord Farnham, and containing near 2,000 acres, the latter, which is not very extensive, to the Bishop of Kilmore; in other directions the soil is cold and sterile. The county representatives are Nathaniel Sneyd, esq, *custos rotularum* of the county, and a director of the bank of Ireland, and Henry Maxwell, esq, nephew to Lord Farnham. The market day is Tuesday, and the fairs are February the 1st, May the 14th, August the 14th, September the 25th, and November the 12th. Population, near 2,000.

**COACHES.**

FROM THE FARNHAM ARMS.  
The Royal Mail, through Cavan from Enniskillen to Dublin at ten minutes past seven in the evening, returns by Cavan to Enniskillen at ten minutes past seven in the morning.  
A Day Coach from Cavan direct to Dublin at nine in the morning.  
The Sholeah, through Cavan from Enniskillen to Dublin at nine in the morning on Mondays, Wednesdays & Fridays, returns by Cavan to Enniskillen at half-past three in the afternoon on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Cars can be hired for the conveyance of Goods from this town to Dublin, or any adjacent place in the county.

**CHURCHHILL**

IS a small post town in the county of Fermanagh, eighty-four miles north-west of Dublin, nine north-west of Enniskillen, nine east-by-south of Belleck, and thirteen east-by-south of Ballyshannon. It stands in a very commanding situation, and is the property of the Marquis of Ely, who is building a handsome residence on an island in Lough Erne, to which the town is contiguous. Here is a plain comfortable church, adorned with a square steeple; within

a mile north-east of the town stand the ruins of the castle of Tully, and at Derryconnelly, two miles distant, are the remains of an ancient church. A considerable butter market is held here, which begins on the first Wednesday in July, and continues until Christmas; the principal buyers are from Newry. The market day is Wednesday, and fairs are held on the 14th of May, and the last day in November. The population is about 150.
