**DOWNPATRICK,**

IS a large and highly respectable market town, pleasantly situated in the barony of Lecale, one of the most fertile in the county, about six miles west of Strangford bay, seventy-two miles north by east of Dublin, and twenty-two south-east of Belfast. The town is flanked with hills on the east and south in a most beautiful manner, confining the view to a small but pleasing prospect. From any of these eminences the scene becomes more extensive, taking in a view of the cloud-capt mountains of Mourne at a distance, and a vast extent of country, beautified by a number of elegant seats and plantations, all highly improved. This is the shire and assize town of the county, and sends one member to the imperial parliament. It has a good market well supplied with all sorts of provisions; and from its situation commands a very extensive trade with the surrounding country; there is also something considerable done in the sale of linen. This place exports large quantities of potatoes and malt, as no barony of the same limits produces such an abundance of these articles as that of Lecale. Downpatrick is celebrated as the burial place of St. Patrick, and is esteemed one of the most ancient towns in the kingdom. On the north-west side of the town stands a conical rath sixty feet high, enclosed by two ramparts, one of which is thirty feet broad; the whole circuit of the works is three quarters of a mile. It is supposed to have been the place of the palace of the kings of Ullagh or Down. The town is large, composed of four main streets converging to a point, intersected by lanes and small streets; it was erected into a bishop's see by St. Patrick, and is now united to that of Connor, under the appellation of the see of Down and Connor. The cathedral, formerly an abbey of canons regular, is a magnificent pile situated on an eminence at the top of English-street. It was founded by St. Patrick, whose remains were interred therein, A. D. 493. In 1538 it was destroyed by Leonard Lord Grey, which profanation constituted one of the articles of impeachment exhibited against him. At the east end is a very lofty and magnificent window, and over it were three niches, where formerly

stood the images of Saints Patrick, Columb, & Bridget. The cathedral is now repaired, the interior elegantly fitted up, and divine service solemnized therein; it has an excellent organ. The parish church is in another part of the town, which, with a Catholic chapel, a Presbyterian and two Wesleyan meeting houses, are the places of public worship. The sessions' house is a large and elegant structure, pleasantly situated, and extremely well adapted for the purpose for which it is intended; the county gaol adjoins; but, as it is too circumscribed for the number of prisoners usually confined, a new gaol, contracted for at 54,000*l.* is about to be commenced, upon a more extensive scale, and in a more eligible situation. A large house, called the hotel, immediately adjoining the court house, was built by the nobility and gentry of the county of Down, who hold their meetings of conviviality in it during the assizes and races; it also contains a ball room of adequate dimensions, and a grand jury room. The infirmary is in a wholesome and pleasant situation. There are also a barrack and a market house. The hospital was erected and endowed by the De Clifford family, for the support of six aged and infirm men and six women, inhabitants of the town. On the same establishment is a free school where ten boys and girls are educated, clothed, fed and apprenticed out. The building is a very uniform and handsome structure. Lancasterian, sunday, and other schools are supported by the liberality of the inhabitants, who are for the most part very respectable, active and intelligent. Lady Savage has also, adjoining her beautiful demesne, a very large establishment for the education of poor children of both sexes. Within a mile of the town there is a celebrated race course, where plate, subscribed for by the corporation of horse breeders, pursuant to a charter granted by James II. is run for. The weekly market is held on Saturday, and fairs are held on the second Thursday in January, the 17th of March, the 19th of May, the 22nd of June, the 29th of October, and the 19th of November.—The population is estimated at 4,000 souls.

**POST OFFICE.**—Post Mistress, Mrs. Rose Mc Iver. The Dublin mail arrives with the letters from Newry, &c. every morning at eleven, and is despatched in the afternoon at a quarter before three. The Belfast mail arrives daily at twelve, and is despatched twenty minutes after the arrival of the Dublin mail. The Strangford letters arrive at ten in the morning, and are sent at twelve. A Post goes to Killybegs three days in the week.
