

DUBLIN, the Fair Trader, every morning at seven, from the Corporation Arms, by the same route, and returns every evening at seven.
DUBLIN, the Shalrock, every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning, at twenty minutes before six, from the Coach and Horses, and returns every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday evening at half-past seven.

IRVINESTOWN

Is a neat small town in the county of Fermanagh, 86 miles north-west of Dublin, 7 and three-quarters from Enniskillen, 4 and a half from Kish, 4 from Ederuy-Bridge, and 5 from Trillick. It is a place of no trade or manufacture, but has several good shops. It consists of a short street, at one end of which is the church with a square steeple, an old stone edifice built in the Gothic style; at the other

end are two Methodist preaching houses. Here is a free school on the establishment of Erasmus Smyth, for 30 poor children, with a salary of 30 pounds per annum and two acres of land for the school master. The market-day is Wednesday, and fairs are held on the 8th of every month.—The population is about 1100.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Oswald Sturdy. The Dublin mail is despatched at five minutes past nine in the morning, on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, and arrives at a quarter past two in the afternoon of the same days. A mail to Kish at 20 minutes past two in the afternoon, on Sundays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays, and arrives at 10 minutes past nine on the same mornings. Letters for England and Scotland go by the Dublin mail.

KILLILEIGH

Is a remarkably pleasant town in the county of Down, 78 miles and a half north of Dublin, 16 south-east of Belfast, 5 north of Downpatrick, and 9 east of Ballynahinch. It is situated upon an arm of Lough Strangford, where ships of considerable burden may lie sheltered from all winds; but a dangerous bar at the mouth of the bay renders this place difficult of access. The public buildings consist of the church, a Presbyterian meeting house, and a neat school house, where children of both sexes are taught upon the Lancasterian system. The Hamiltons, created Lords of Clanebois, and subsequently Earls of Clau-brassel, had their chief residence here in an ancient castle, erected at one extremity of the street, which is now the occasional residence of Archibald Hamilton Rowan, esq. who is lord of the manor, and with

Lord Dufferin, both descendants of that noble family, owns the town and adjoining estates. This place suffered considerably in the rebellion of 1641. It was a borough previous to the union, and sent two members to the Irish parliament. It is governed by a seneschal in the person of Mr. Robert Kennedy, who holds manor courts every three weeks. Sir Hans Sloane, the celebrated naturalist and physician, was born here on the 16th of April, 1660. There is an extensive cotton manufactory now building, which will add materially to the trading consequence of the town. The market-day is Friday, but it is not now attended. Fairs are held on the 10th of April, Trinity Monday, 10th of October, and 11th of December.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. William Thompson. The letters arrive from Dublin, Newry and Downpatrick, every day at half-past twelve, and depart every morning at 25 minutes before eleven. The letters from Belfast and Donaghadee arrive every morning at 25 minutes before eleven, and depart every day at half-past twelve.

KILLYSHANDRA,

IN the county of Cavan, is a market, post and fair town, situated on the Croghan, a tributary stream to the river Erne; it is 61 miles north-west of Dublin, nine west of Cavan, and 15 and a half south-west of Clones. This is the greatest linen market in the county, and the inhabitants of the town and neighbourhood are principally employed in its manufacture. Here is a small church, with a Methodist meeting house, and the Catholic chapel. The town consists of one street, in the centre of which is a convenient market house with a good clock; two magistrates sit

every Thursday for the administration of justice, in pleas of almost every description, whether civil or criminal; the present magistrates are Robt. Henry Southwell, esq. proprietor of the town, and John Godley, esq. The only charitable institution in Killyshandra is a dispensary. There is also a barrack for a company of infantry. The market is held on Wednesday, and fairs are on January the 28th, March the 23rd, May the 9th, June the 22nd, August the 20th, September the 28th, and November the 8th.—Population about 900.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Richard Anderson. The Dublin mail leaves at four in the afternoon, and arrives at nine in the morning. Mail for Ballinamore at 10 minutes past nine in the morning; for Cavan and Crossdoney, with the Dublin mails. Letters for England go by Dublin; for Scotland by Cavan.
