

KILREA

IS a small town in the county of Derry, 100 miles north by west of Dublin, six north west of Portlone, 10 north of Castle-Dawson, 12 south south east of Coleraine, and 32 north west of Belfast. It is built in the form of a diamond with four small streets branching from the main ones. The places of worship are the Protestant church, a Presbyterian meeting house, and, within a mile of the town, a Catholic chapel. A free school has lately been established for children of both sexes on the foundation of Erasmus Smyth, with a house and two acres of land, given by

the Mercers' company of London, who are the proprietors of this town, for the use of the master. A general market is held every Wednesday, and a linen market on the second and fourth Wednesday in every month. The fairs are Ash-Wednesday, Easter Wednesday, Whit-Monday, Wednesday before Old Midsummer, first Wednesday in August, (old style) October 10th, first Wednesday in November, (old style) and Wednesday before old Christmas. The population, according to the last census, was 973.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Felix Cunningham O'Neill. The Dublin mail is despatched at half past three in the afternoon, and arrives at forty minutes past nine at night. A by-mail goes to Coleraine at five in the morning, and returns at half past three in the afternoon. Letters for England go by the Dublin mail, those for Scotland by the same mail to Portlone, and then to Donaghadee by Belfast.

No Coaches pass through this town. The Royal Mail from Londonderry to Belfast runs through Ballymoney, distant eight miles, at half past twelve at night. Hired carriers convey goods to any part of the Kingdom.

KING'S COURT

IS a market, post and fair town in the county of Cavan, 37 miles north north west of Dublin, six south of Carrickmacross, six east of Bailieborough, and six north east of Virginia. Here are a neat church with a square tower and one bell, a Catholic chapel, and a Methodist meeting-house. The town consists of one long street, in the middle of which is a market house, possessing a good clock. A public dispensary was founded here on the first of August 1801. One

mile to the south of the town is Cormy castle, the beautiful seat of Colonel Pratt, and about the same distance to the north is Cabra castle, the residence of the Rev. William and the Rev. Joseph Pratt. The market day is Tuesday. Fairs are held on March the 26th, May the 23rd, June the 18th, August the 1st, September the 19th, November the 3rd, and December the 4th and 20th. The population is about 1400.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Thomas Wood. The mail for Dublin departs at half past four in the afternoon, and arrives at a quarter past seven in the morning. Carrickmacross mail at the same time. Letters for England by the Dublin mail, for Scotland by Donaghadee.

COACH.

A day Coach to Dublin through King's Court from Clones every day at a quarter past ten in the morning, and returns to Clones at a quarter before three in the afternoon.

LARNE,

OR, as it was anciently called, Inver, situated on a lough, or harbour of the same name, on the coast of Antrim, is 98 miles north of Dublin, 13 north of Belfast, 10 south east of Glenarn, and 16 north east of Antrim. The chief articles of commerce here are rock salt, lime stone, and provisions, considerable quantities of which articles are still exported; but, on account of its proximity to Belfast, its business has considerably declined within the last few years. The linen and bleaching business are extensively carried on by Messrs. Barklie; there are also considerable flour mills, and at a short distance from the town is a cotton manufactory. Besides the parish church, there are three Presbyterian, a Methodist, and a Roman Catholic chapel. Larne is divided into the old, and new town; the latter consists of one spacious and well built street. On a peninsula, called the Curran, stand the ruins of old Fleet castle, and on

the road to this castle are the remains of a little chapel, called Clondumales. The castle is supposed to have been erected by one of the Bissetts, a powerful Scotch family, in the time of Henry the third. At this spot Edward Bruce landed in 1315, with the expectation of making himself master of Ireland; which invasion caused much bloodshed, and was productive of many dreadful calamities to the English settlers in this part of the kingdom. The neighbourhood of Larne is extremely pleasant, the land very fertile, and, as a summer retreat during the bathing season, surpassed by few in the north of Ireland. A market is held here for provisions on Wednesday, and for yarn, flax, and cattle on the first Monday in the month. The fairs are on the 31st of July and the first of December. Population about 3500.

POST OFFICE, Cross-street.—Post Master, Mr. James Cooch.—The Dublin mail is despatched at four in the morning, and returns at a quarter past two in the afternoon. The Glens mail leaves daily at half past two in the afternoon, and returns at eleven in the morning.
