LETTERKENNY

Is a considerable market and post town in the county of Donegal, on the banks of the Swilly, one hundred and thirteen miles north-north-west of Dublin, thirty-four north by east of Ballyshannon, twenty-one and a half north by east of Donegal, and six north-west of Raphoe. Within half a mile is Port Ballinacree, whither vessels of one hundred tons bring iron, salt, colonial produce, &c., and whence they export hides, butter, &c. This is the market for a very considerable tract of country; the principal commodities sold here are linen, yarn, cattle, and provisions. The town consists of one tolerably well built street, and commands

a view of the country around for a considerable distance. Letterkenny possesses a parish church, a Catholic chapel, no less than three dissenting meeting houses, a dispensary, and a good market house, over which the general quarter sessions are held twice in the year. The market day is Friday, and fairs are held on the Friday before Candlemas day, the Friday before St. Patrick's day, Good Friday, the 12th of May, Friday before the 12th of August, the 8th of November, and the Friday before Christmas. The Population is near 2,000.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. James Fey. The Dublin mail is despatched at eleven at night to Raphoe, and arrives at thirteen minutes past seven in the evening. The Dunfinaghy mail leaves this office at a quarter past seven on Sundays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and returns on Sundays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays. LIFFORD,

THE county and assize town of Donegal, is pleasantly situated on the banks of the river Foyle, one hundred and one miles north-west of Dublin, three quarters of a mile from Strabane, eight north-west of Newtown-Stewart, and eleven south of Londonderry: it is under the patronage of the Earl of Erne, and before the union sent two members to the Irish parliament. The county infirmary is much too small for the county. In the reign of Charles I. it was a barrack for a troop of horse; it was purchased from government by Richard Cowan, esq., and afterwards sold to the county for the present purpose. A new gaol, now building, is expected to be finished in

the early part of 1825; it will be a spacious semi-circular edifice, and will add much to the beauty of the town; the court-house is adjacent. The church is a handsome structure with a square steeple; the Rev. Wm. Knox is the present rector. In the reign of James II. Sir Richard Hansard, Bart. of Lincolnshire, bequeathed fifty pounds per annua, and a house, for the education of the poor of the parish. Lifford is remarkable for a vigorous resistance made by Capt. Hamill, with a small body of men, against a detachment of James the Second's army, previous to the siege of Derry, in the year 1690. The fairs and market are held at Strabane. Population about 400.

LISBURN,

IN the county of Antrim, is a borough and post town pleasantly situated on the banks of the Lagan, by which it is separated from the county of Down, distant seventy-three miles north of Dublin, seven south of Belfast, fourteen south-east of Antrim, and sixteen north-north-west of Downpatrick. The parish church, which by patent from Charles II. was erected into a cathedral for the united dioceses of Down and Connor, is an extensive structure, and particularly distinguished for the architectural beauties of its fine lofty spire & steeple of cut stone. The Catholic chapel has a plain external, but the interior has a neat pleasing appearance. There are also here a Presbyterian chapel, a meeting house for the Society of Friends, and two Methodist chapels. The vicinity of this town to Belfast in some measure prevents its rapidly increasing in extent; notwithstanding which the linen and corn trade are carried on with great spirit. The linen manufactured in this quarter has long obtained a decided preference in the markets. The corn market is likewise frequented as affording the best seed oats of any in the county. The Baile-hall, where the weekly sales are made, is convenient-

ly situated and sufficiently capacious; it was erected by the Marquis of Hertford, whose patronage the town enjoys. The inconvenience experienced for want of a suitable corn-market, will shortly be removed, it being in contemplation to erect a market house by subscriptions, which now nearly amount to the sum requisite for its completion. The county infirmary in Castle-street contains upwards of sixty beds, and affords relief to twelve hundred out-patients; the surgical duties are ably fulfilled by Dr. Wm. Stewart, M. R. C. S. By the formation of a Philanthropic society in 1810, for the prevention of mendicity and the relief of beggars, great benefit has been derived. The industrious female, on application at the spinning institution, obtains the object of her wishes, constant employment; flax is distributed to her in small quantities upon security, rendering her independent of a supply from hawksters at the highest retail price, and preventing the sacrifice of her labours to them, when the pressure of poverty deprives her of the power of waiting for a favourable market. A school for boys and another for girls on the Lancasterian system are supported by subscription. A Sunday
