LONDONDERRY, OR DERRY,

THE capital of the county, 114 miles north-north-west of Dublin, is a place of very great antiquity, and, according to Sir James Ware, is called in the old Roman provincial Darish, and by ancient authors Doire Chalgach, the grove of Calgach. It was also called Doire-choluim-chille, or Columbkil's Oak-grove. This place is mentioned in history at so early a period as the year 516, at which time it appears St. Columb founded an abbey here for Augustinian Canons. Derry is a bishop's see and returns one member to parliament. In 1613 King James I. by letters patent, incorporated the Irish society of London, by the name of "the governors and assistants of the new plantation of Ulster;" and granted them the fort and town of Derry, and divers other towns, villages, &c. to be united, and thenceforth and forever to be a county distinct in itself, by the name of the county of Londonderry. By the same charter it is ordained, that the town of Derry shall always be called the City of Londonderry; and that it be governed by a mayor, aldermen, recorder and two sheriffs, the jurisdiction of the latter to extend both to the city and county. In the year 1637, by a decree of the court of star chamber, this charter was cancelled and made void; but, upon the restoration, King Charles II. granted a new charter, which recited all the clauses of the old one with very little alteration. Londonderry is renowned in history for the noble defence made by its inhabitants at the time of the revolution, during a siege of 105 days of almost unparalleled privations and famine, against an army of 20,000 men, commanded by King James II. in person. On the 7th of December, 1688, the gates were

closed against James's troops; and the city was closely invested from that time until the night of the 30th of July following, when the enemy raised the siege, and retreated from their works before the town. In this desperate and prolonged contest, the loss on the part of the garrison was ten thousand three hundred and sixty-one persons; and that of the enemy upwards of eight thousand men. This fine city has not in the least degenerated from its ancient respectability and consequence, and may be ranked with any of its size in the kingdom, for elegance and cleanliness. It is beautifully situated on a rising ground above the noble river Foyle, which flows round nearly two thirds of the eminence. The ramparts nearly a mile in circumference, and faced with stone, are from 14 to 37 yards in breadth, and from 20 to 25 feet in height, with bastions, and six entrance battlemented gates; the walls, although built in the year 1617 are in perfect repair, and form a fashionable and picturesque promenade. The streets within the gates are spacious, well paved, lighted and cleaned; the houses in general are handsome, and built of brick. The Diamond, a large handsome square in the centre of the city, adds greatly to its beauty; in the middle is the exchange, a fine stately building. The cathedral, which stands on high ground, is a grand Gothic structure, with a lofty square tower containing ten fine toned bells; it is furnished with a good organ, and was built in 1633, under the inspection of Sir John Vaughan; and the tower has a fine effect when viewed at a short distance. The new court house, of which two much can scarcely be said, is a recent erection in Bishop-
