

street; it was built from an Athenian model, furnished by Mr. Boden, of the finest stone and in the most chaste style of architecture: in the central front is a grand portico, supported by four massy fluted pillars, on the top are the King's Arms, on one side the emblematical figure of Mercy, and on the other that of Justice, finely sculptured in stone; in fact, the entire edifice is an elegant display of taste and grandeur. The other public buildings are the linen-hall, theatre and county goal, which has been lately enlarged at an expence of 30,000*l.*; there are also excellent shambles, and a good fish market, both well supplied. Across the river is a wooden bridge that deserves particular mention, constructed by Mr. Samuel Cox, of Boston, North America. This wonderful structure is 1068 feet in length, and 40 in width, with a broad parapet on both sides for foot passengers. It is lighted by 26 lamps; at about a third of its length, is a fine turning bridge, with very ingenious machinery, to admit vessels through. The water, that supplies the city, is carried across this extensive bridge in metal pipes; indeed take it altogether it is an elegant, curious and wonderful erection. The mercantile trade consists in the export of linen and linen yarn, grain, meal, mess pork, beef, and considerable quantities of butter; the imports are rum, brandy, wines, tea, sugar, flax-seed, timber, &c. carried on in the town and suburbs; the traders of Derry are highly respectable, and failures are scarcely ever known here. The places of worship are the cathedral, a Protestant chapel of ease, a Presbyterian chapel, a Covenanter meeting house, one Wesleyan Methodist chapel, and one for Methodists of the New Light, a Catholic and an Independent chapel. The charitable institutions consist of a city and county poor house, an infirmary and dispensary, a society, conducted by ladies, for the relief of sick and indigent room-keepers, a bible society, and a savings' bank; all respectably and well conducted. There is also a good news room, with an elegant library attached to it. The country round is fertile and pleasant, and the river adds much to its picturesque beauties. The quays are good and commodious, and the harbour for shipping is extensive and safe. Londonderry of late years has been frequently visited by the viceroys of Ireland. Upon the arrival of George IV. in Ireland, the city and county of Londonderry voted loyal addresses to his Majesty, which were presented to the king at his first levee held in Dublin Castle, on the 21st of August, 1821, and received in the most marked and gracious manner. The market-days are Wednesday and Saturday, and fairs are held on the 17th of June, the 4th of September, and the 17th of October.—The population is estimated at 12,000.
