NEWTOWNARDS,

IN the county of Down, is a handsome, tolerably  
 large, and ancient market town, 87½ miles north of  
 Dublin, 7½ east of Belfast, and 6½ west of Donagha-  
 dee, pleasantly situated at the northern extremity  
 of Strangford Lough, and well sheltered from the  
 west and north by the contiguous hills. It was for-  
 merly a borough, and sent two members to the Irish  
 Parliament. The town has a handsome square, in  
 which is a large and elegant market house, with a  
 neat cupola, clock and bell. There are several good  
 streets leading into the square. In High-street is a  
 very curious piece of antiquity, called the cross; it  
 is ornamented on each side with coats of arms and  
 other devices, and bears the date of 1636. Here is  
 an ancient church, with a chapel adjoining. The  
 parish church, lately erected at the north-west end of  
 the town, is a beautiful and elegant modern Gothic  
 structure, in the best style of architecture; it has a  
 lofty and finely proportioned spire; the whole com-  
 posed of cut stone. In this place was formerly a  
 castle, the residence of the noble family of Montgo-

merly. Newtownards is remarkable for the number of  
 places of worship it contains, there being no less  
 than six of different denominations, besides a Ca-  
 tholic chapel. The Presbyterian meeting house is a  
 large and new erection, pleasantly situated upon an  
 eminence. The town is the property of the Marquis  
 of Londonderry, who has a magnificent seat within  
 four miles. Here is a large school, supported by  
 this nobleman's family, for the education of poor  
 children of both sexes. Newtownards also possesses  
 a House of Industry, where the poor of the parish  
 find an asylum and the means of subsistence; it is  
 supported by subscription, and is under the direction  
 of the more wealthy inhabitants of the parish, which con-  
 tains eighteen townlands, tithe free, and a popula-  
 tion estimated at 6000 souls. There is a weekly  
 market, besides which there is a large market, or fair,  
 every month and three other fairs in the year, viz.  
 on the 23rd of January, the 14th of May, and the  
 23d of September.

NEWTOWNLIMAVADY,

IN the county of Derry, is pleasantly seated on the  
 banks of the river Roe, on the high road from Derry  
 to Coleraine, one hundred and six miles north-north-  
 west of Dublin, thirteen north-east of Londonderry,  
 twelve south-east of Coleraine, and seven north of  
 Dungiven. The town is well built, and much im-  
 proving. The church is a neat building with a tower;  
 besides which there are a Catholic chapel and several  
 dissenting meeting-houses. At the bottom of Cath-  
 erine-street are the new corn market and butchers'  
 shambles, the property of Edward Boyle, esq. built  
 with brick, supported by cast iron pillars, and re-  
 markably well adapted to the purposes of their erection.  
 In the Main-street is the old market house, the upper  
 part of which is occasionally used as a ball room.  
 The library is supported by subscription, as well as  
 that praise-worthy and benevolent institution, which

clothes the poor; there is also a savings' bank. A  
 little without the town are the extensive bleach  
 greens of Messrs. Alexander. Here are also two  
 extensive distilleries and a brewery, which consume  
 much of the corn brought to the market. Over the  
 river is a good stone bridge of six arches, from  
 which there is a fine view of Roe Park, the residence  
 of John Cromie, esq. which is well wooded, and  
 contributes much to the beauty of the town. In  
 Main-street is the celebrated King's arms inn, con-  
 ducted by Mr. Mercer, who is justly famed in this  
 quarter for the excellence of his accommodations  
 and his polite attention to his hosts. The market for  
 general purposes is held on Monday, that for grain on  
 Tuesday and Friday. There are fairs on the 29th of  
 March, 13th of June, 12th of July, and 29th of  
 October.—Population near 2000.
