NEWTOWN-STEWART

Is a neat small town in the county of Tyrone, pleasantly situated on the banks of the river Strule, which, about two miles below, forms a junction with the Derg, and then changing its name to Morne proceeds on and empties itself into the Foyle at Lifford; in this river there is great abundance of salmon trout, &c. It is 93 miles north-north-west of Dublin, seven north-north-west of Omagh, seven south-south west of Strabane, and 19 south of Londonderry. Adjoining the town are the remains of an old castle, about the date of the erection of which history is silent; and at the bottom of Main-street are the ruins of a castle, which James II. slept in on his march to the siege of Derry, in the year 1690; a few days after he returned, and destroyed it by fire.

At the upper end of the town fronting the Main-street stands the church, a small, but neat stone edifice, with a high spire, from which there is a fine view of the surrounding country; the present rector is the Rev. Dr. Richard H. Nash. Besides the church here are two Methodist, and one Presbyterian meeting house, and a Catholic chapel. The charitable institutions are a dispensary, and a Protestant and a Methodist Sunday school. About three miles from the town is Baron's Court Castle, the magnificent mansion of the Marquis of Abercorn. The market day is Monday; and fairs are held on March 28th, June 2nd, October 10th, and December 11th.—The population is about 700.

OMAGH,

is a neat and large town of Tyrone, is pleasantly situated at the confluence of the Drumraw and the Derg, about 15 miles north-north-west of Dublin, 7 miles south-west of Newtown-Stewart, 14 south-south-east of Strabane, 6 from Lowrystown, 6 west of the north of Strabane, and 7 south by west of Strabane. In the year 1743 this town was consumed by fire, and soon afterwards rebuilt in a superior manner. It now consists of one principal street with new avenues branching from it. In the 15th century a Dominican monastery was erected here, but not a vestige of it remains. At the lower end of the town are scattered ruins of an old castle, supposed to have been built about the year 1400, are still visible. At the north-east entrance of the town stands the church, a neat stone edifice, which has lately been much enlarged, and ornamented with a high spire, which causes a very pleasing effect. The present rector is the Rev. Robert Burrows, Dean of Cork. Omagh possesses also two meeting houses for Presbyterians, one for Methodists, and a Roman Catholic Chapel. The county gaol, erected about 30 years ago, has a castellated front; it is, however, much too small; and a large addition is now erecting,

which will be finished in 1825, and render it a commodious, ornamental, and secure building; attached to the gaol is a lunatic asylum. Fronting the Main-street is the court-house, an elegant piece of architecture, finished two years ago; in front are four massy pillars in the Doric order, at the top are his majesty's arms, cut in solid stone, also a good clock in front is of essential service to the town. Near the centre of the Main-street stands the county infirmary, a neat and convenient building, under the inspection of Surgeon Thomas Maxwell. Omagh has a free school supported partly by subscription, and partly by a small sum allowed by the society for discountenancing vice, and a neat small barrack for two companies of foot. The market, which is well supplied with all kinds of provisions and linen, is held on Saturday. The fairs are January 12th, the second Thursday in February (old style), April 5th, the second Thursday in May (old style), the second Thursday after the 24th of June, August the 5th, the second Thursday in August (old style), October 2nd, November 3rd, and the second Thursday in November (old style).—The population in 1821, was 1864.

POST OFFICE. Main-st.—Post Master, Mr. Hamilton Wallace. The Dublin Mail is despatched at half-past twelve at noon, and arrives at one in the afternoon. The Derry and North West Mails arrive at half-past twelve at noon, and are immediately despatched with the Dublin Mail. A by-mail from Fintona arrives at twelve at noon, and departs with the Dublin Mail. Letters for England go by the Dublin Mail, and those for Scotland by the Dublin Mail to Aghnacloy, and then by a cross-post to meet the Belfast Mail.
