**PORTGLENONE,**

**DISTANT** 96 miles north of Dublin, six north by east of Castle-Dawson, four north by east of Bellaghy, seven west of Ballymena, seven north north east of Maghera, and eight north by east of Magherafelt, is a market and post town in the county of Antrim, on the banks of the Bann, over which is a handsome stone bridge with seven arches, by which it communicates with the county of Derry. This river carries off the superfluous waters of Lough Neagh, and empties itself into the sea below Coleraine, from which place it is navigable for vessels of from 50 to 100 tons burden. Adjoining the town is a delightful mansion, the summer residence of the Right Honble.

and Right Rev. Nathaniel Alexander, Lord Bishop Meath. The places of worship are a chapel of a Presbyterian, and a Seceding meeting house, adjacent to the town is the Catholic chapel. parish church is at Ahoghill, which is four m distant from the town; the Rev. Henry Leslie is present rector. The general market is on Tuesday and a linen market is held on the first and second Tuesday in May, (old style). **POST OFFICE.**—*Post Master*, William Adams. The Dublin mail is despatched to Castle-Daw every evening at five, and arrives at four minutes past eight at night. The Kilrea, Gavagh, Coleraine Londonderry mails leave at half past eight in the evening, and are due at 40 minutes past four in the afternoon. Letters for England go by the Dublin mail, and those for Scotland by Castle Dawson and Belfast Donaghadee.

**COACH.**

The Magherafelt day Coach runs through Castle-Dawson, distant six miles, to Belfast, every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, at half past seven in the morning, and returns on alternate days at half past seven in the evening.

Hired cars convey goods to any part of Ireland.

**RANDALSTOWN,**

**N**EAR the northern shores of Lough Neagh, is a smart improving town, in the county of Antrim, 84 miles north by west of Dublin, 16 north-west of Belfast, 4 west of Antrim, and 7 1/2 south of Ballymena. It is the sole property of the Right Hon. Lord O'Neill, whose residence at Shean Castle, about two miles from the town, was, a few years since, accidentally burnt to the ground; his lordship now resides in a handsome cottage built on the domain. The river Main runs through the town, over which is a good stone bridge of nine arches; in Lord O'Neill's domain there are also two other bridges over the river, which, together with the fine plantations of this estate, make it one of the finest retreats in the north. The public buildings are a small church, two dissenting chapels, a Roman Catholic chapel, a public dispen-

sary, and a very neat barrack, built by Lord O'Neill, and now occupied by the staff of the Antrim militia. In Main-street is the market-house, and adjoining the river are the very extensive cotton mills and bleach ground of Mr. Charles McCauley, which give employment to upwards of eight hundred of the neighbouring poor. At the foot of the bridge is a very commodious inn overlooking the river. The mail road from Belfast to Coleraine and Londonderry runs through the town, which consists principally of one main street. A weekly market is held on Wednesday for grain, and a linen market on the first Wednesday in each month. There are fairs on the 16th of July, and the 1st of November. Population 1025.

**POST OFFICE**—*Post Master*, Mr. Wm. McDermot. The Dublin mail arrives at three in the afternoon, and leaves at six every morning. A by-mail goes to Magherafelt at fifteen minutes past three in the afternoon, and returns at eleven every morning. Office hours from seven in the morning until ten at night.
