SAINTFIELD,

IS a small, but remarkably neat town in the county of Down, 78 miles north of Dublin, and nine south by east of Belfast. It consists principally of one street, intersected at right angles by another of less extent. The public buildings are a church, a Presbyterian and a seceding meeting house, a Roman Catholic chapel, and a market house, over which is a room where the courts are held. This town owes its flourishing condition to the munificence of its spirited proprietor, Nicholas Price, esq. of Saintfield House, who is also the Lord of the manor. It is governed by a seneschal, John Mc Burney, esq. who holds manor courts every third Tuesday. On the 9th of June, 1798 a brisk skirmish took place between a party of the yeomanry and the rebels, when the latter, from the preponderating superiority of numbers, obtained the advantage, and took temporary possession of the town. The market is on Monday, principally for yarn, and the fairs are January 26th, the second Thursday in February (old style), the second Thursday in March (old style), the third Thursday in April (old style), the third Thursday in May (old style), the 26th of June, the 30th of July, the 26th of August, the third Thursday in September, the 26th of October, the third Thursday in November (old style), and the first Thursday after Christmas day. The population of the town and its precincts in 1821 was 963, and of the parish 7038.

POST OFFICE.—*Post Master*, Mr. Andrew Hunter. The mail from Dublin and Belfast arrives every morning at half past ten, and departs every afternoon at a quarter past three.

STEWARTSTOWN,

A SMALL market, post and fair town in the county of Tyrone, 80 miles north by west of Dublin, six north of Dungannon, 11 north of Charlemont, 16 north by west of Armagh, 22 east of Omagh, and 32 west by south of Belfast. In the centre of the town is the market house, over which the petty sessions are held once a fortnight by the magistrates of the division. Here is also a day school with a salary of 12l. a year to the master allowed by the society for the suppression of vice, and a small sum paid quarterly by the parents of the children. A Sunday school is also held in the same room, which, although the town is but small, is attended by upwards of 300 children, many of whom are from the surrounding neighbourhood. A dispensary has been lately established here under the superintendence of William B. Whittle, surgeon. The places of worship are a Protestant church, a Presbyterian and a Seceding meeting house, and a Catholic chapel. About two miles from the town is Stewart Hall, the residence of Earl Castle Stewart. James Caulfield, esq. of Muff near Cookstown is proprietor of the place. The market is held on Wednesday, and there are fairs on the Wednesday after the 12th of March, May 1st, November 1st, and September 10th.

POST OFFICE.—*Post Master*, Mr. Joseph Dudgeon. The Dublin mail is despatched at ten minutes before two in the afternoon, and arrives at twenty minutes before twelve in the morning. A by-post to Cookstown at a quarter before twelve in the morning, and another to Dungannon with the Dublin mail. Letters for England by the Dublin mail, for Scotland by Donaghadee.

The Royal Mail runs from Dungannon, distant six miles, to Dublin, every day at four, and returns every morning at ten.

Cars may be hired for the conveyance of goods to any part of the kingdom.

STRABANE,

ONE hundred and eleven miles north-north-west of Dublin, seven north-north-west of Newtown-Stewart, and eleven south of Londonderry, is a large populous town in the county of Tyrone, delightfully situated on the banks of the Moyne, and commanding a fine prospect of Lifford Bridge, erected across the river Foyle. It gives title of Viscount to a branch of the noble family of Hamilton, and was a borough previous to the union. The linen trade of Strabane is of great importance, and it may be considered the third town in Ireland for the quality and quantity of that branch of manufacture; the provision trade in mess beef and pork, which is chiefly shipped to England and Scotland, is also carried on very extensively. The butter trade is not so considerable as it would be, if parliament were to extend the act to Strabane; the butter that is now taken to this market must undergo an inspection at some town, to which the act does extend, before it can be exported; if this obstacle was removed, it would probably be as large a butter market as any in the kingdom. The canal, which is wide and deep, with a large basin, is about four miles in length, and communicates with the Foyle; opposite to Port Hall, it is navigable for vessels of 200 tons burden. Some time ago, a line of canal was marked out from Port Hall to Lough Erne, which in all probability will be executed, as government has liberally offered to advance ten thousand pounds towards its completion. Lough Erne is navigable for an extent of 40 miles, and the opening of so desirable a communication would be of the highest national importance, besides the gratification of hundreds of the poor being usefully employed. The places of worship in Strabane are a Protestant church, a Catholic chapel, two Methodist meeting houses, and a Presbyterian meeting house. Here are a good market-house, a fever hospital and dispensary, a savings' bank, and a female charity school, which gratuitously educates 70 children; Mrs. S. Hamilton is patroness. Another free school educates and clothes twelve poor boys, and the same number of girls; this is supported by a donation of 32l. per annum, and by public contributions. The market days are Tuesdays and Saturdays. There are four fairs in the year, viz. February 1st, May 12th, August 1st, and November 12th. The population is about 6000.
