

STRANORLAR,

IS a small post, market and fair town in the county of Donegal, one hundred and two miles north-west of Dublin, twenty-two and a half north-east of Ballyshannon, eight south-by-east of Letterkenny, and ten and a half west-by-south of Strabane. It is pleasantly situated on the banks of the Fin, and within half a mile of the smart village of Ballybofey; over the river is a neat stone bridge of three arches. Adjoining the town are Drumbo Castle and Demesne, the residence of Sir Samuel Hayes, bart. The castle is a fine stately building of the modern order, and the

wood on this domain gives a relief to the neighbouring country, which is otherwise bleak for many surrounding miles. The places of worship are a small church, a Catholic chapel, and two dissenting meeting houses; there are also a dispensary and a public school. This improving town has a weekly market on Saturday, and fairs are held on the 28th of March, the last Wednesday in May, old Midsummer day, old Lammas day, Old Michaelmas day, and the last Wednesday in November. The population is about 700.

POST OFFICE—Post Master, Mr. Samuel Brown. The Dublin mail arrives from Donegal at eleven every night, and is despatched at twelve at noon. Office hours from seven in the morning till eleven at night.

TANDERAGEE,

IN the county of Armagh, sixty miles north-by-west of Dublin, eleven north-by-west of Newry, nine west by north of Armagh, seven and a half south-by-west of Lurgan, and four south-by-east of Portadown, is situated on a hill, and commands an extensive view of the surrounding country, which is remarkable for the beauty of its rural scenery. The church, a handsome Gothic structure, was re-built in 1812, and Miss Sparrow, now Lady Mandeville, greatly contributed towards completing it. The Roman Catholic chapel is a plain building, and at Clare, a little distance hence, are two Presbyterian meeting houses. Near the church is the mansion of Lord Mandeville,

patron of Tanderagee; it commands a beautiful view of a romantic and finely wooded demesne, and was built many years ago on the site of an old castle, formerly the residence of the chief of the Sept of the O'Hanlans. At the lower extremity of the town is a very handsome school house, built, endowed, and supported by the present Lady Mandeville, for thirty boys and an equal number of girls. The country round this town has long been celebrated for the manufacturing of yard-wide linens. The market is held on Wednesday, and there are fairs on the first Wednesday in February, the first Wednesday in May, the 5th of July and the 5th of November.

POST OFFICE—Post Master, Mr. Richard Trotter. The mails from Dublin and all other parts, except Gilford, arrive at seven every morning, and depart at five in the evening. The Gilford mail arrives every evening at five, and departs every morning at seven.

WARRENPOINT,

IN the county of Down, is a small, but rapidly improving town, pleasantly situated at the distance of five miles south-east of Newry, and two from Rostrevor. This place and its immediate neighbourhood contain a large number of comfortable lodging houses for the accommodation of visitors, hot and cold baths, and an excellent inn; its vicinity also abounds with most delightful scenery. On passing through the town toward the shore, the prospect becomes extremely beautiful and grand; the bay of Carrigford expanding to the view, and forming a noble basin, where a thousand ships may ride in perfect safety, is bounded on the right and left by lofty mountains; at the extremity of the prospect the lighthouse and blockhouse, and the vessels passing the bar present to the eye a very pleasing sight. Sixty years ago this place was scarcely known, there being

at that time only one house and a large rabbit warren, from which the town derives its name. The quay is very convenient and capable of receiving vessels of large burden. A newly erected church adds much to the beauty of the place, which also contains a Presbyterian meeting house, a Catholic chapel, a dispensary, and a savings' bank. In the vicinity of the town there is a neat row of houses, called Seaview, extremely well adapted for the accommodation of bathers; the prospect from which is very fine, commanding a view of the whole bay, of the quay of Rostrevor, and the adjoining wood, together with the entire vale diversified with beautiful plantations, magnificent seats, and elegant cottages. There are five annual fairs, viz: the 17th of January, the 4th of May, the 24th of June, the 2nd of September, and the 29th of November. The population is estimated at 500.

POST OFFICE—Post Mistress, Mrs. Jane Forrest. The Newry mail, taking letters for Dublin and all parts of the kingdom, leaves every evening at seven, and arrives in the morning at the same hour, when it proceeds with the letters for Rostrevor and Kilkeele.
