VIZ. ASSOCIATIONS, ASYLUMS, HOSPITALS, PENITENTIARIES, SOCIETIES, SCHOOLS, &c.

Association incorporated for discountenancing Vice, and promoting the Knowledge and Practice of the Christian Religion, instituted in 1792, and incorporated by Act of Parliament in 1800. Meet at No. 7, Capel street, every Thursday at one o'clock, from October to July.

Association for the Suppression of Mendicity in Dublin, established in the year 1818. This institution provides food and employment for the paupers of the city. General Repository, Copper-alley.

Association for the Improvement of Prisons and Prison Discipline in Ireland, formed 9th December, 1818. The Committee meet at 16, upper Sackville street, every Friday.

Asylums for Aged and Infirm Female Servants, 12, Lower Dorset street, and 67, Summer-hill.

Asylum for Females discharged from Prison, Circular-road, Harcourt-street.

Bedford Asylum, Brunswick street.

Blue Coat Hospital, or Free School of King Charles the Second, Oxmantown.

Board of Health (General), constituted for the purpose of obtaining early information respecting the appearance, progress and causes of epidemic diseases in Ireland. Francis Barker, M. D. Secretary.

Charitable Dispensary, Meath street.

Charitable Infirmary, for the relief of persons requiring immediate surgical aid, Jervis-street.

Charitable Loan. The Governors meet at St. Ann's Vestry Room, the first and second Tuesday in every month.

Charitable Society, instituted 1790 for the relief of sick and indigent room-keepers. Mr. John Grehan, Secretary and Collector, 3, North Anne street.

Charter School, Upper Baggot street.

Cherghman's Widow Houses, 2 Mercer street.

Commissioners for General Control and Correspondence, and for the Superintending and Directing the Erection, Establishment and Regulation of Asylums for the Lunatic Poor in Ireland. Charles H. Todd, Esq. Secretary, 3, Kildare street.

Cow Pock Institution, 62, Sackville street, opened 14th February, 1804, for the gratuitous inoculation of the poor, and for supplying the different parts of the kingdom with genuine infection.

Dispensary for the Infant Poor, Clarendon street.

Dispensary for the Parishes of St. Mary and St. Thomas, Cole's-lane, Henry-street.

Dorset Institution, 7, Abbey-street.

Dublin Female Penitentiary, Circular road, North. A repository is opened at the house, for the sale of fancy works, baby linen, &c.

Dublin Free School, John Jones, Master, 2 School-street.

Dublin General Dispensary and Humane Society, 4, Fleet-street, instituted in 1782, for medical and surgical relief to the sick and diseased poor of the city.

Dublin Universal Dispensary, School-house-lane.

Dublin Philanthropic Society, organized on Mr. Owen's plan, July 1823, 4, Lower Sackville street.

Dublin Infirmary, for the cure of patients labouring under diseases of the skin, Moore-street.

Dublin Weekly and Daily Schools, School-street.

Dunn's (Sir Patrick) Clinical Hospital, Grand Canal-street, opened October 25, 1808, for the instruction of students in medicine, and for the admission of persons in moderate circumstances afflicted with fever and chronic complaints, by paying a small sum when admitted; very poor patients are supplied with clothing when they leave the hospital.

Eustace-street Male and Female Charity School, Eustace-street and Essex-street.

Female Asylum Penitentiary.

Female Orphan House, Circular road. His Majesty, by his own most gracious offer, became patron of this charity, August 30, 1821.

Female Penitents' Retreat, 106, Mecklenburgh-street.

Fever Hospital and House of Recovery, Cork-street.

Freemason's Female Orphan School, 4, Gloucester-place, Mecklenburgh-street.

Foundling Hospital, Mount-brown, founded 1704, on the 10th of October, 1822, there were in the house 1123 children, and nearly 7000 with nurses in the country.

Friends' Poor House, Cork-street, 13, Borr-street.

General Free School, (Boys) Mill-street.

Hibernian Bible Society, 16, Upper Sackville-street, instituted in the year 1806. The sole object of this Society is to encourage a wider circulation of the authorized version of the Holy Scriptures, in Ireland, without note or comment.

Hibernian Church Missionary Society, 16, Upper Sackville-street, established to collect funds in support of Missions to the Heathen, in connection with the established Church.

Hibernian Marine Society and School, Sir John Rogerson's Quay. Since the establishment of this school, to the year 1823, 1560 boys and upwards have been admitted, of whom a near 1000 have been apprenticed to the sea-service, and sent on board the royal navy.

Hibernian Society, for the care of soldiers' children. Subscriptions received at all the banks in Dublin in aid of this charity; Capt. Irving, Secretary.

Hibernian Society, for aiding the translation of the Holy Scriptures into foreign languages, 22, Upper Sackville street; the Rev. John Short and B. Digby, Esq. Secretaries.

Hospital of St. Mark and St. Ann, Mark street.

Hospital for Incurables, viz. 23 men and 33 women, who are lodged, boarded and supplied with medicine, Donnybrook-road.

Hospital for Poor Lying-in Women, Great Britain street, first instituted in the year 1745.

House of Industry, near Brunswick street, North, opened on the 8th November, 1773. In this institution the poor are classed according to their respective conditions; the children are educated, clothed and dieted in separate asylums, and the sick are lodged in appropriate hospitals.

The Talbot Dispensary is attached to the House of Industry, and was opened on the 24th April, 1820, for the relief of the sick poor of the north west district; any, who are not able to attend at it, are visited at their own residences.

House of Reception for destitute children, bereft of parents, Prussia-street.

House of Refuge, 54, Baggot-street, established in 1802, for the reception of young women out of employment, who have been brought up in charity schools, where they reside and are kept in the employment of sewing, &c. till they can be accommodated with eligible service.

Incorporated Society for the Reception of Females from Chartered Schools, till they can be apprenticed out, Lower Baggot-street.

Institution for the Cure of Diseases of the Eye, Kildare-street, open for patients from eight to ten o'clock every morning.

Institution for the Industrious Blind, Great Britain-street.

Institution for the Relief of the Ruptured Poor, at the Richmond Surgical Hospital House of Industry, where a surgeon attends the first Monday in every month, to examine applicants, and to apply trusses, &c. gratis, on proper certificates being procured from the hospital.
