HACKETSTOWN

Is a village in an angle of the county of Carlow, and barony of Rathvilly, thirty-two miles south of Dublin, seven from Tullow, and fourteen from Carlow. This place was furiously attacked by the rebels on the 25th of May 1798, but successfully defended by the yeomanry and a small party of the Antrim militia. Hacketstown is pleasantly built on an eminence; the church, in particular, stands on a commanding situation, and is a neat stone building, to which a handsome tower was added in 1820. A Catholic chapel, now building, will, when finished, be a spacious and handsome edifice. Here are twelve fairs in the year, viz: on the 13th of January, the 12th of March, the 13th of April, the 4th of May, the 13th of July, the 21st of August, the 18th of September, the 16th of October, the 21st of December; the other three fairs are held in February, June and November, but the day for holding them changes yearly. The population, according to the last census, was 1006.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Edward Boyde. The Mail is conveyed by horse to Baltinglass on Sundays, Wednesdays and Fridays, at two; and returns on the same days, at forty minutes past eight. The office is open from seven till eleven.

HOWTH

Is a small town, situate seven miles and three quarters N. E. of Dublin, at the foot of a promontory, or stupendous eminence, called the hill of Howth, which forms the northern entrance to Dublin bay. It gives the title of Earl to the ancient family of Tristram, now called St. Lawrence, for the valorous achievements of Sir Armandricus Tristram against the Danes on St. Lawrence's day, in 1177. The venerable mansion, or castle of the Earl of Howth, which has been in possession of the family above six hundred years, is boldly situated on the west side of the hill, where it is partially wooded, and commands an extensive view of the channel; the upper part of this immense elevation, being destitute of timber, has a naked and barren appearance. The place is celebrated for the spacious harbour lately erected there, and whence the mails and packets are despatched for Holyhead; it is also a secure retreat for vessels in stress of weather. At the entrance of this harbour is a fine light-house, and there is another situated more southerly, at the lower part of the hill, for the direction of ships entering the bay. Ireland's Eye, as it is called, is a dangerous island, composed of an elevated rock, about half a mile north of Howth, and where many a mariner has met an untimely grave; on its west side are the remains of a chapel; some fragrant and medicinal plants grow on this small island, which is about three quarters of a mile in length, and about half a mile in breadth. The pleasant little village of Beldoyle is about a mile distant, and is well adapted for bathing, being agreeably situated on the open beach, and commanding a fine prospect of the sea, Howth, Ireland's Eye, and Lambay. Howth itself is very pleasantly and romantically situated, and the intervening country between it and Dublin is very delightful both on account of the numerous beautiful seats, with which it is interspersed; and the enchanting prospects it commands in all directions; it has a good hotel, but no business of any description is transacted in it, as it is chiefly inhabited by fishermen. The established church is a neat building situated on an eminence at the entrance of the town, with a tower and pinnacles; and a large Catholic chapel has recently been erected, which is a great embellishment to the town; the interior is very handsome and possesses a fine altar-piece and organ. A small school has been lately established at Howth, which is intended to be considerably augmented upon the parochial system; the Roman Catholic schools here, and at Beldoyle, are extensive, and under the management of the parish priest. No market or fair is held here.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Harbour Master, and Packet Agent, Lieut. James Brown, R. N. Letters are despatched and arrive by the Dublin mail daily.

KELLS,

AN improving inland town, situated in the county of Meath, 37 miles west by north of Dublin, 11 north-west of Trim, 18 west of Drogheda, and 24 south west of Dundalk, has a corporate body, and is of much antiquity. Walter De Laey, Lord of Meath, granted the corporation considerable lands for their use for ever; this grant was successively confirmed by Elizabeth and James. In the centre of Kells stands an old castle in good preservation, said to have been built in 1178; opposite to which is a very fine stone cross, ornamented with curious inscriptions in the ancient Irish characters, and worthy the notice of the antiquarian. The church was rebuilt in 1811 in a handsome manner, the interior is fitted up in an elegant, modern style, with a very fine organ; the spire was erected in 1787. In the church-yard stands a round tower of great height, said to have been erected by the Danes, but its use and the date of its erection are not known. Here is also an ancient stone house, or abbey, called the Abbey of
