

Columb-kill, who is looked on as tutelary saint of this parish, and is said to have resided here; it is a singular piece of architecture, and well worth the notice of the curious stranger. The Roman Catholic chapel is of the Gothic order, and when finished, will be a handsome building; the altar-piece is a fine representation of the Ascension, painted by Guido, and presented to the chapel by the Marquis of Headford, who is the proprietor of the place. The other public buildings and institutions are the court house, in which the sessions are held twice a year, a good ball room, the hospital, fever-house, and dispensary; there are also an extensive market-place, and public

shambles. In a commanding situation, and not far from the town, is a fine pillar, which was erected by the Bective family, in a year of scarcity, to give employment to the poor. Kells is governed by the Marquis of Headford, as Sovereign, and his Deputy, William Keating, Esq. who is also magistrate of the town, and causes it to be well watched, lighted, and cleaned. A good market is held on Saturday for corn, cattle, pigs, &c.; and fairs on the Thursday before Shrove Tuesday, on the 3rd Thursday after Easter Sunday, the 9th of September, and the 16th of October. The population in 1811, was 3872, and in 1821, 4845.

POST OFFICE.—*Post Master*, Mr. Henry Dinning. The Dublin Mail arrives by the Enniskillen Mail at two in the morning, and is despatched at twelve at night by the same coach. KILBEGGAN

Is a small market and fair town situated on the banks of the river Brusna, in the county of Westmeath, 44 miles west of Dublin, 8 east of Moate, 15 east of Athlone, and 5 north of Tullamore. It was formerly a borough town, and sent two members to the Irish parliament. Its municipal governors are a portreeve and burgesses. The church stands on the bank of the river and is a neat stone building, with a square tower and one bell. There is also a

Roman Catholic chapel. The only charitable institution of this town is a dispensary. There is no manufactory carried on here, but during the butter season a great deal of business is done in that article, and here are two extensive breweries, belonging to A. and B. M'Manus and Mr. John Fallon. The market-day is on Saturday, and fairs are held on March 25th, June 16th, and October 28th.—Population about 1800.

KILCOCK,

A POST and fair town on the high road to Galway, is 15 miles west of Dublin, 11 north of Naas, and 10 south by east of Tria, in the county of Kildare. It is pleasantly situated on the royal canal, which flows through the town, and by which passage boats go to and from Dublin, several times in the day. This place suffered greatly in the rebellion of 1798; part of it was destroyed, and the residence of Colonel Aylmer was burnt to the ground. The

races, which commence on the 18th of August, continue a week, and are well attended by the neighbouring gentry. Killock has neither trade nor manufactures, and principally depends on its thoroughfare, on two weekly markets, one for corn on Wednesdays, the other for meat on Saturdays, and on its four annual fairs, which are held on the 25th of March, the 11th of May, the 11th of August, and the 29th of September.—Population 1320.
