KILCULLEN,

A MARKET TOWN and considerable thoroughfare on the high road from Dublin to Cork, is in the baronies of South Naas and Kilkullen, and in the county of Kildare. The town stands in the united parishes of Kilkullen and Carnallaway, and is 21 miles distant from Dublin, 103 from Cork, and 6 from Naas. Over the river Liffy, which runs through the town, is a good bridge of stone, with six arches, whence there is a fine view of the mansion of Henry Carter, esq. and of the remains of New Abbey, erected by Sir Rowland Eustace, in 1460, for Franciscan friars. The ruins of old Kilkullen are yet standing, near which was fought a battle between the rebel army and General Dundas, in 1798. Here is a neat parish church, which was erected in 1815; also a capacious Catholic chapel, a fever hospital, and a dispensary. A good market is held on Saturday, and there are six fairs in the year, viz. February 2d, March 25th, June 11th, October 2d, June 22d, and December 8th. The population is about 1400.

KILDARE

THE county town, is 25 miles S. W. from Dublin, 10 from Naas, and 5 from Monastereven, and was constituted a borough in the fourth year of King James the second. It is governed by a sovereign, two provosts, and burgesses, elected annually on the 21st of September. It is a place of great antiquity, and formerly sent two members to the Irish Parliament. The cathedral church is much dilapidated, a small part only being kept in repair for divine worship; it is in the diocese of Kildare, and the present dean is Dr. Trench. This place anciently contained an Augustinian convent, supposed to have been founded in the year 500. In the church yard stands a round tower, 150 feet in height, supposed to have been used as a watch tower in the time of the Danes. Near the church yard is the White Abbey, an establishment for Carmelite friars, of which the Rev. Michael Hughes is prior. Here are also the remains of a convent of the Franciscan order, and near the White Abbey is a neat chapel, with a charity school. Behind the church stands the parish chapel, a neat slated building. A new county hospital has been erected on an extensive scale. The Turf Club have a club house here for their accommodation during the races; it is a modern stone building. The celebrated races are held on the Curragh, near the town, four times in the year, viz. in the last week in April, the second week in June, the second week in October, and the first week in September; those held in September are the principal ones, and called, by way of pre-eminence, the Royal Meeting. His present Majesty, George the Fourth, visited these races in 1821, on which occasion a new stand was erected by the Turf Club. His Majesty annually gives to the Club a whip, value one hundred guineas. The Curragh is supposed to be one of the finest commons in Europe, and contains three thousand acres, on which are three hare parks; the hares from these preserved grounds afford much sport to the neighbouring gentry. In the town of Kildare stands a neat market house, and adjoining to it is a well, which supplies the town with water. The inhabitants were much distressed for this necessary article, until within a few years past, when a machine was placed over the well for pumping the water into an adjoining cistern for the use of the inhabitants. The sessions are held here, and there is a market on Thursdays, besides four fairs in the year, viz. on the 12th of February, the 12th of May, the 29th of June, and 19th of September. The population is 800.

KILKENNY,

THE largest inland town in Ireland, delightfully situated on the banks of the river Nore, in the county of the same name, and in the province of Leinster, is 57 miles S. by W. of Dublin, 20 N. E. of Ross, and 25 nearly N. of Waterford, and exhibits as many natural beauties, and possesses as many local advantages, as any other inland place of the United Kingdom, having a direct communication by the river Nore with Waterford and the sea. It comprises the city of Kilkenny or English Town, and the borough of St. Canice or Irish Town, besides extensive suburbs. Each enjoys its respective rights and immunities, and exercises legitimate functions within its respective limits. The city is governed by a mayor, recorder, 2 sheriffs, 18 aldermen, 36 common council men, and 2 coroners; the mayor is elected on the 29th of September, and continues in office for a year. The town is governed by a portreeve. Each corporation, previously to the union, returned two members to the Irish Parliament, but, since that period, the aggregate votes of the freemen and freeholders of both return only one member to the united parliament, though the local incorporate rights of each remain unaltered. The town was formerly, as it is now, of great consequence, as may be seen by the venerable ruins of churches, monasteries and abbeys, which even now, in their perishing state, exhibit such specimens of exquisite taste in architecture, as may vie with most modern improvements. The remains of its gates, towers, walls, and bastions, prove it to have been a place of great strength, and the obstinate resistance, made by a much reduced and feeble garrison, commanded by the intrepid Sir Walter Butler against Cromwell, who besieged it in March, 1650, con-
