COACHES.

The Galway Mail goes for Dublin at 23 minutes after 12 at night, and for Galway at 20 minutes after one in the night.—The Sligo Mail at half-past

twelve at night for Dublin, and for Sligo at half-past one in the night.

BALLINA LOE Day Coach at half-past twelve for Dublin, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and returns for Ballinasloe at half-past eleven in the morning, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

LONGFORD Day Coach for Dublin at eight on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays; for Longford on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

MULLINGAR Day Coach for Dublin at nine in the morning on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, and Sundays; returns on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, and Sundays.

LANESBOROUGH, OR LAINSBRO,

A Post and fair town, sixty-two miles north-east of Dublin, eight west of Longford, ten east of Ballymahon, and seven north of Roscommon, is situated on the banks of the Shannon, and lies partly in the county of Longford, and partly in Roscommon. The provinces of Connaught and Leinster are here divided by the Shannon, over which is a fine stone bridge of nine arches, built in 1706. The Shannon is navigable, and an easy intercourse is kept up with the metropolis, Limerick, Athlone, &c. The corn trade is extensively carried on, and upwards of 20,000 barrels are annually sent hence to the Dublin market. Lainsboro was once a borough town, and before the union sent two members to the Irish parliament; it formerly gave title of viscount to the family of Lain. The castle of Rathcline stood here in magnificent grandeur, until Colonel Mc Guire, in the reign of King James II. levelled it with the ground. About a mile north of the town are the remains of Clontuskert abbey, once an establishment for Augustinian friars. Here are also the ruins of an old castle built by O'Hanly, and the remains of a church, dedicated to St. Patrick. Luke White, and Christopher Bellew, esquires, are proprietors of the place. A market is held here on Wednesday, and a fair on the 12th of February.—Population about 1500.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. John Costello. The Dublin Mail goes to Longford at a quarter before three in the afternoon, and returns at half-past eight in the morning. Office hours from seven in the morning till eleven at night.

CONVEYANCE By Water.

The Beats of Messrs. Harwood and Martin, and of Patrick Rorke, leave Lanesborough and Richmond Harbour, once a week, for the conveyance of goods to Dublin, Mullingar, Ballymahon, and Killoek, returning from Broadstone-Harbour, Dublin, by which means goods are conveyed to Richmond-Harbour and Lanesborough, and thence to Longford, Roscommon, and the neighbouring towns by land carriage.

There are no regular Carriers from Lanesborough, but Cars may be hired for the conveyance of goods.

LEIGHLIN BRIDGE,

A Market and post town in the county of Carlow, is forty-five miles from Dublin, twelve from Kilkenny, and six from Carlow, on the high road to Kilkenny. The town is romantically situated on the banks of the river Barrow, over which is a neat stone bridge of nine arches. The market for corn and butter is much improving; the butter is conveyed by the river to Waterford, for the London and other markets. Among the public buildings of this place is the church, which stands on the west side of the river, and from the yard of which there is an extensive view of the country for many miles round; the windings of the river add much to the beauty of the scene. There are also two Roman Catholic chapels, and an establishment for Carmelite friars. At the foot of the bridge are the remains of a very extensive castle, said to have been destroyed by Cromwell. About a mile from the town is a famous spa, much esteemed for its beneficial effects on consumptive habits. Leighlin is the sole property of Wm. R. Stewart, esq, whose hospitable and neat mansion is seated on the east side of the river; the lofty wood on his estate adds much to the beauty of the town. The market days are Monday and Saturday; a market is also held on Friday for butter. There are four fairs in the year, viz: on Easter Monday, the 14th of May, the 25th of September, and the 27th of December. The population is near 2000.

Office hours from seven in the morning till eleven at night.

LEIXLIP

IN the county of Kildare, is a market and post town, situated in a beautiful valley eight miles west of Dublin, four east of Maynooth, and eleven north of Naas. From the Dublin road there is a most delightful view, as the town is nearly surrounded by the rivers Liffy and Rhy, which unite at the foot of Leixlip castle. This castle stands on a most commanding eminence, majestically soaring above the town; it is the property of Colonel Connolly, but the residence of the Hon. George Cavendish, and deserves to be visited by every stranger. Near the town in the river Liffy are the famous salmon-leap and water-fall, annually visited by many thousands of the admiring curious. The woollen manufacture is carried on here, and a market is held on Saturday. Population about 700.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Anthony Bacon. The Dublin Mail is despatched by the Galway mail at twenty minutes after four in the morning, and arrives at half-past nine at night. Celbridge mail by Horse at half-past nine at night, and returns from Celbridge every evening at fifty minutes after seven. Office hours from seven in the morning till eleven at night.
