MARYBOROUGH

THE capital of Queen's county, is forty miles west of Dublin, and on the high road to Limerick. The town was formerly called Protector, and the county of Leix. It is now governed by a burgo-master and two bailiffs, who are chosen annually.

MAYNOOTH

IS a post and fair town, in the county of Kildare, twelve miles west of Dublin, twenty-seven east of Mullingar, nine from Naas, and three from Kilkock. Here is the royal college for the education of candidates for the Roman Catholic priesthood, which was founded previous to the Irish rebellion, and called St. Patrick's college. It is capable of accommodating four hundred students, and is supported by an annual grant from Parliament of nine thousand pounds; its present superior, or president, is the Rev. Dr. Crotty. Near the college are the ruins of an ancient castle,

COACHES, &c.

The Ballinasloe Day Coach for Dublin arrives on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, at 1/2 past 3 in the afternoon, & returns for Ballinasloe on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays at eight in the morning. The Longford Day Coach for Dublin arrives on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, at four in the afternoon, and returns for Longford on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, at ten in the morning. The Tullamore Van for Dublin arrives on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, at three in the afternoon, and returns for Tullamore on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays at ten in the morning.

MONASTEREVEN,

A Market town in the county of Kildare, thirty miles south-west from Dublin, ten north west from Athy, and ten north-east from Mountmellick, on the high road to Limerick, is pleasantly situated on the banks of the river Barrow. Near the town is the seat of the Marquis of Drogheda, called Moore Abbey, which is delightfully varied with wood and water, and exhibits some very rich and picturesque scenery. This abbey was formerly an establishment for Franciscan friars. The church is a modern building with a well proportioned tower at one end. On the road to Portarlinton stands the Catholic chapel, a good skated building of the Gothic order. Here is also an English Protestant chartered school (under the direction of the incorporated society of Dublin), which educates and clothes one hundred and forty girls, apprentices them at the age of fourteen, awards a premium to each, who honestly serves her apprenticeship, and, in most instances, a small sum is given as a marriage portion. The other charitable institutions of this place are a dispensary, and several schools supported by subscription. The grand canal passes close to the town, by means of which goods are conveyed to and from Dublin. No inconsiderable support to this place are the extensive brewery and distillery, belonging to John Cassidy, esq, who is chief magistrate. The building is lighted with turf gas, and affords employment to many of the industrious poor. In the town is a good market house, erected by the Marquis of Drogheda. The market day is Saturday; there are also four fairs in the year, viz: on the 17th of March, the 16th of June, the 31st of July, and the 6th of December. Population about 2000.
