NEWTOWN MOUNT KENNEDY

Is a small inland town, in the county of Wicklow, situated 16 miles south of Dublin. It is a place of no manufacture, but the vicinity abounds with romantic scenery, and the seat of Marquis Wellesley, called Woodstock, about a mile and a half from the town,

deserves to be visited by every stranger. It has a free school for five boys and five girls. The fairs are on the first Tuesday in April, and the last Wednesday in October, for cattle, &c. The population is about 500.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Robert Roc. The Dublin mail arrives at eleven in the evening, and is immediately despatched for Wexford. The Wexford mail arrives at three in the morning, and proceeds without delay for Dublin. The letters for Arklow, Rathdrum, Wicklow, Ashford, Delgany and Bray, are despatched at the same time, and by the same conveyance.

PHILIPSTOWN,

ALTHOUGH not the most considerable town, is deemed the capital of the King's County, and is 38 miles nearly west of Dublin, 7 south east of Tyrell's Pass, and 10 west of Edenderry. It was so named in honour of Philip II. king of Spain and consort of Mary queen of England, who made this part of the county into shire ground, in the year 1557. It is but a small place; for the metropolis of a county, yet has a barrack, a church, and a Roman Catholic chapel, a handsome court house, where the assizes are held, and a strong built gaol for debtors and felons. The only charitable institution is a free school for 30 boys, supported from the charity funds left by Mr. Erasmus

Smyth. Philipstown consists of only one street, which is wide and well paved, and the houses are built in uniform order. Previous to the union it returned two members to the Irish parliament. At the eastern extremity is FORTH castle, where king Philip lodged during his tour through this part of the country; it is now the residence of Bernard D. Smith, Esq. The grand canal runs close to the town, and has tended materially to improve its condition. The fairs are on January the 3rd, March the 18th, May the 15th, June the 14th, August the 17th, October the 18th, and December the 3rd. The market is held on Thursdays.—The population is about 900.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. William Ellis. The Dublin mail is despatched at five in the evening, and arrives at 10 minutes past five in the morning. The Geashill mail is despatched at five in the evening. Letters for England and Scotland by the Dublin mail. Office hours from seven in the morning till nine at night.

PORTARLINGTON

Is a respectable borough town, 35 miles west of Dublin, 5 from Mountmellick, and 9 from Maryborough. The river Barrow divides the town into two unequal portions, the larger being situate in the Queen's County, and the smaller in the King's County. The estates of Portarlington were granted by Queen Elizabeth to Lord Clonmoline. His successor, for his conduct in the rebellion of 1641, was attainted of treason, and forfeited all his lands, which were bestowed on Sir Henry Bennett, one of the ministers of Charles II. who was created Lord Arlington, and obtained a charter for a corporation and manor. In 1666 a patent was granted him for the name of Portarlington, from which the town derives its name. The estates became forfeited again in the rebellion of 1688, and in 1696 King William granted the lands to his Dutch followers, and his favourite Lord Galway, who made leases of the town and estates for ever to a number of French Protestants, who came over with him. He also erected two churches, one for the French and the other for the English; and these

are still continued, and endowed with sufficient lands. He assigned funds for an English and a French school, which were the means of establishing in Portarlington those eminent seminaries, which have produced some of the most shining characters in the kingdom; and the inhabitants feel an honourable pride in the circumstance of the present viceroys and his illustrious brother Wellington having been educated among them. The town is the resort of a great part of the rank and fashion of Leinster, is governed by a sovereign, and sends one member to the British parliament. The church is a neat edifice with a lofty spire. A celebrated spa was discovered here about 30 years ago. The markets are held on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and there are eight fairs in the year, viz. on the 5th of January, the 1st of March, the 8th of April, the 22nd of May, the 4th of July, the 1st of September, the 12th of October, and the 23rd of November.—The Population amounts to near 3000.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. James Shewcraft. The mail is conveyed by horse to Monastereven every evening at eight, and returns at seven in the morning. Office hours from seven in the morning till seven at night.
