RATHANGAN

Is a small but neat market town, consisting of one street with a few well built houses. It is situated in the county of Kildare, 26 miles south west of Dublin, and 9 south east of Edenderry. Although it is a place of no particular trade, it has been much improved within these few years, and is now in a thriving state. The church is a handsome stone building with a tower and one bell. The Catholics,

Methodists, and Quakers have each a place of worship. The grand canal passes by the town, which is a great convenience. The market, which is on Monday, is well supplied with corn, butchers' meat, &c. Fairs are held on Whitsun-Tuesday, August the 25th, and November the 12th.—The population in 1821, was 976.

RATHDRUM

Is a small market and post town in the county of Wicklow, situated on the river Avonbeg, and distant 30 miles south of Dublin, 9 north west of Arklow, and 36 north of Wexford. The church is a handsome

stone building with a tower and one bell; the Rev. Richard Powell, the present rector, was the founder of Sunday schools in Ireland. The town has a spacious woollen hall, for the sale of flannels, and a market is held for that purpose on the first Monday in every month, which the Dublin merchants attend. This hall was completed in 1793, at the sole expense of Earl Fitzwilliam, who is proprietor and Lord of the Manor of the parish of Rathdrum; and as there was then no Roman Catholic chapel, this munificent nobleman granted to the town and neighbourhood the use of it for a place of worship, as soon as it was finished. It was converted into a barrack during the time of the rebellion in 1798; it is now used as a Sunday school, which commenced about midsummer 1823, and in five months time contained, by the exertions of the curate, the Rev. James Currie, upwards of 300 scholars of all denominations, who are

taught gratuitously by the inhabitants of the place. There is also a charitable institution, founded by Mr. John Tate, of Fanningneiren, of 250 pounds a year of landed property, for the use of the industrious poor of the parish of Rathdrum, who are accommodated with small sums without paying any interest. There is a fine spa at a place called Drinkitt, on the estate of Mr. Kemmis, about three miles west of the town. The Messrs. Eccles, two brothers and liberal magistrates for this county, are about improving the road between Rathdrum and Dublin, by way of Roundwood and Enniskerry, which will bring this place within 21 miles of Dublin. Fairs are held on the first Thursday after old candlemas day, April the 5th, last Thursday in May, July the 5th, last Thursday in August, October the 10th and December the 10th, for cattle. The market day is Thursday. The population is about 700.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. William Saul. The Dublin mail leaves at twelve at night, and arrives at half-past one in the morning. The Wicklow, Newtown-mount-Kennedy and Bray mails at the same time. Letters for these mails should be put into the office by nine at night. The Arklow, Tinnehealy, and Carnew mails leave at three in the morning.

RATOATH

Is a village in the county of Meath, 12 miles north west of Dublin, 11 south west of Trim, 11 south of Navan, and 3 south east of Ashbourn. It is the property of James Corballis, esq. who resides here, and, before the Union, returned two members to the Irish parliament. A new church with a tower was erected here in 1817; it is of the Gothic order, and as it is

built on an elevated situation, it may be seen for many miles round. In the centre of the town is an extensive mount, which, tradition says, was thrown up in the time of the Danes. Three fairs are held in the year: viz. on the 18th of April, the 1st of June, and the 20th of November.—Population about 400.

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STRADBALLY,

A MARKET town in the Queen's county, 39 miles south west from Dublin, six from Athy, five from Maryborough and 10 from Mountmellick, is pleasantly situated, and surrounded by a delightful country. It is a vicarage and a barony. The town consists of one long street, which is remarkably clean. In the

neighbourhood are many gentlemen's residences; the one most deserving of admiration is Stradbally hall, the seat of the Cosby family. Of this delightful and enchanting residence, beautifully diversified with wood and water, the pen can convey but a very inadequate idea; it must be visited to be known. In the
