PASSAGE BOATS.

A Passage Boat sails from the Grand Ca-
nal Harbour every morning at seven,
and another every evening at nine to
Dublin, through Philipstown, Eden-
derry, Robertstown, Sands, and Hazel-
hatch. A boat from Dublin arrives at
half-past eight in the evening; and
another at four in the morning; and
proceeds on to Shannon Harbour,
where it arrives at 9 the same morning

TULLOW,

AN improving market and post town, 38 miles south
of Dublin, and 8 south east of Carlow, is very plea-
santly situated on the banks of the Slaney, over which
it has a good stone bridge of five arches. It was for-
merly a walled town, with a tower and extensive
barracks. On the site of ground, on which part of
the town now stands, was formerly an abbey, founded
by Simon Sambers and Hugh Tallon. It was con-
veyed by Queen Elizabeth to the Earl of Ormond,
and reduced with the town by Cromwell. Here is a
small church, and a spacious and handsome Catholic
chapel, in which are three galleries & a handsome altar.
Adjoining to the chapel is a nunnery, founded by the

late Dr. Delaney Roman, Catholic Bishop of Kildare,
who also founded the monastery; both of these esta-
blishments participate in the education of youth.
The extensive flour mill of Mr. Joseph Doyle, and
the brewery of Mr. William Carte, have encouraged
a good corn market, which is on Saturday, and none
in the county is better attended: considerable quan-
tities of butter are also bought up for the Carlow and
Waterford markets. Besides the sessions for the
barony, which are held here, there are five fairs in
the year; viz. on the 20th of January, the 21st of
April, the 10th of July, the 29th of October, and
the 21st of November. Population about 2300.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. James Ball. The Dublin Mail is conveyed by horse to Carlow
at 20 minutes past five in the evening, and returns next morning at 20 minutes past seven. The Clongal,
and Newtown Barry mails leave at 25 minutes past seven in the morning, and return at 25 minutes past five
in the evening. Office hours from eight in the morning till eleven at night.

WEXFORD,

Called by the Danes, who built it, Wexford, is
the capital of the county, and a seaport, 64 miles
south of Dublin, 19 east of New Ross, and 12 south
east of Eunisworthy. It is situated under a hill upon
the river Slaney, over which there is an elegant
wooden bridge, by much the largest and handsomest
in Ireland, being 1554 feet in length, and 34 feet in
breadth. It consists of 75 piers of oak driven into
the ground, six timbers in each pier; it has a port-
cullis for passage of shipping up and down the
river, and ebb tides there are 16 feet of water
underneath. The harbour is exceedingly capacious,
but divided; the inner harbour being four miles in
length by one in breadth. The river, which is navigable
